ew years bring new beginnings and a chance to reflect upon where we have come from and to look forward to where we are heading. In January, it is the practice of the church membership to review the ministry over the past year through our annual report – both in narrative and financial form. Over the past few years we have done this during a Congregational Conversation, which we held between services in the Lounge. Continuing the mantra of this pandemic – we won't be able to do it that way this year.

Still, your Session wants to make sure you know what has happened over the past year, so we are making a new way for the Congregational Conversation in 2021. Because we cannot hold large gatherings inside, we're moving the conversation to Zoom. We will have the same information at two different meetings, and you're invited to attend one or both of them. These meetings will be on Wednesday, January 20 at 6:00 or Thursday, January 21 at 1:00.

You'll hear from Session members about the ministry in 2020 and our hopes for 2021. There will be time for your questions as well. If you have questions that you would like answered, I'd encourage you to send them in advance to me or Carrie Rivette, the Clerk of Session. We can make sure the appropriate person gets your question and can provide a thoughtful answer to it at the conversation or even direct to you. If you can't attend the meeting, feel free to send in your questions, and we'll respond to them. While we'd prefer that these conversations could happen in person, we want to make sure these conversations can happen to keep the church in step for its ministry in 2021.

Also, Session has called for the Annual Congregational Meeting on Sunday, January 31, 2021, at 11:30. The purpose of this meeting is to approve the Terms of Call for both Pastor Kristine and me, and, if the way be clear, to elect a deacon to a two-year term. More information will be coming about the format of that meeting as it gets closer - maybe we'll be in the parking lot again! In worship that Sunday, we'll get a chance to ordain and install our elders and deacons. Surely, we'll be doing that in an entirely new manner as well, so stay tuned. If nothing else, we've learned how to be flexible and creative in ministry over the past year!

Finally, as we turn into 2021, know that my prayers join yours as we pray for health, stability, and a return to being together. This is hard, but we are strong. I do look forward to glad reunions when the time is right!

Dear Church Family,

I'm sure you're just as excited as I am to have said "Good-bye and good riddance!" to 2020! While it will be a while before the general population receives the vaccine, the fact that it's been rolled out to health workers is extremely encouraging. Hope is on the horizon! A specific kind of hope anyway. Since true hope can only be found in Jesus Christ, we've had hope all along. As it's a new year and a new beginning I'd encourage you to focus anew on the hope we have in Christ. For this reason I'm excited about the all-church spiritual practice in which the Faith Formation Committee hopes you will participate. What better way to start a new year (especially after the kind of year we all just lived through) grounded in God's word, which will ground us further in Christ's hope?

Beginning January 4 there will be packets available during church office hours (8-4pm, M-F) at the Clinton Street entrance to help you personalize scripture for yourself and others. When personalizing scripture you insert your name into a passage, giving you a prayer that's right out of scripture. For example Psalm 32:7 reads:

"You are my hiding place; you will protect me from trouble and surround me with songs of deliverance."

When personalized Psalm 32:7 will read:

"You are <u>your name here</u> 's hiding place; you will protect <u>your name here</u> from trouble and surround <u>your name here</u> with songs of deliverance."



We also encourage you each week to insert another person's name into that same passage of scripture and to send them a card (included in the packet) to let them know how you've been praying for them. Each week there will be a different passage of scripture to personalize and to use as a prayer for yourself and others. We tend to start the New Year with resolutions to get into better shape and in better overall health. Let's not forget, however, our spiritual health as well. While Christ is always with us, if we neglect to spend time in God's Word, prayer, in Christ-centered community, and in serving others in Christ's name, our ability to sense Christ's presence is lessened. So let's start 2021 off right by being grounded in God's word in order to strengthen our awareness of Jesus Christ himself in our midst.

The light and love of Christ with greetings of hope for the New Year have been sent to First Presbyterian Church from our mission co-workers. They also thank members for the love shared when we pray for them and our help in sustaining them through financial gifts.

This month we share a letter from the husband and wife team of Rev. Cathy Chang and Rev. Juan Lopez, who work in the Philippines as Regional Facilitators for Addressing Migration and Human Trafficking in East Asia:

Greetings from the Philippines!

We pray that you and your families, and the faith community in and around Grand Haven, are keeping safe and healthy in mind, body and spirit. Although this year has been filled with tremendous challenge and hardships due to the pandemic, we're grateful for your commitment to God's mission. Thank you for your financial gift in early September.

Before Thanksgiving, our global partners with the UCC in the Philippines hosted a virtual international solidarity forum. 2021 Generosity Campaign Update



From the Worship Committee

December Worship Survey Results

The Worship committee thanks the 133 people who responded to our worship survey. Here is a brief summary of the results and our conclusions.

With about 80% of the respondents always or usually watching our streaming worship service, the most highly appreciated parts of the service were the sermon, the prayers, and the announcements. The offertory and singing were the least liked parts. The divide between those who like the contemporary and those who like the traditional service was clear in the responses and the written comments. The worship committee had a long discussion about the results, and hopes to take action to improve the online worship experience while honoring that there are varied ways to worship our great God.

The committee and the Pastors have no intention of continuing with a single blended service once normal worship resumes. We will also be considering resuming two services in the short term when small groups of in-person worshipers are again permitted. You may also notice recent efforts to include more frequent use of the elements of traditional worship, such as visible font, table, and pulpit into the service.

We recognize that singing at home during the online service is difficult, and we have tried to support this with more of the service participants miked for the songs. However, singing remains one of the more dangerous ways of spreading the virus, so we are restricting the number of singers for both contemporary and traditional songs.

Although the offertory is not well appreciated, we want to keep it as part of the service, since it represents our response of gratitude to being forgiven and hearing the gospel. Please recognize that those performing during the offertory are stand-ins for you, the congregation, in offering thanks. We are trying to be more diverse in our presentations during the offertory, and will be making more use of recordings of the choir from pre-pandemic services. While we must worship primarily online, we will continue to hone the service to make it worshipful, reverent, and engaging.

Highlights:

- We discussed the possibilities for Christmas Eve services and decided it was best not to allow in-person worship until the community spread of the pandemic is lower.

- We approved our 2021 Session meeting dates.

- Listen to, amplify the voices of partners, and join in action toward these goals

- Mitigate the impact of disasters and their underlying causes

5-8th Grade, Sunday nights from 6:15-7:30 pm

The Gospel of John

Our 5-8th grade students are invited to read the Gospel of John together. This season, we meet 18 times together and there are 21 chapters of John. So, we won't finish all of it together. But we will get through lots of it! The Gospel of John contains a well known verse, memorized by lots of Christians because of its beautiful reminder. That verse is John 3:16-17: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only son, so that everyone who believes in him won't perish but will have eternal life. God didn't send his Son into the world to judge the world, but that the world might be saved through him." Each week, we are going to start by saying one of these verses aloud together. By the end of our time together this winter/spring- I bet you will have memorized it too! Students will also be invited to respond to the Word creatively each week. 9-12th Grade, Monday nights from 6:30-8:00 pm

Revelation

Many people believe that Revelation is one of the toughest books of the Bible. It is often avoided because of this. Though it is difficult, it is also a text that vividly and beautifully shows readers Christ's longings for his faithful followers. We will not be reading all 22 chapters during our time together. But we will read a large chunk of this tricky and rewarding text together. As is always the case, students are encouraged to approach this opportunity knowing that all of us are learners. It is okay to be confused or even frustrated with the stories inside the Bible, just as it is okay to be excited and joyful. We will be taking Revelation slowly- so there will be lots of room for questions. Students will also be invited to creatively respond to the Word each week using methods we learned together in the Fall.
