Worship matters. The most Presbyterian of catechisms, the Westminster, begins with this question – "What is the chief end of man?" – and it answers, "Man's chief end is to glorify God, and to enjoy him forever." Worship serves many purposes and meets many needs, but chief among them is that God created us to worship. It is core to who we are.



Worship has continued every Sunday and on many Wednesdays since we were last able to gather in person. We certainly miss worshipping in person, but live streaming worship is still worship.

I urge you not to take that for granted, particularly in this season when interaction interpersonally is hard to do. Still, I miss you, and I know you miss gathering together. Live streamed worship cannot replicate the experience of sharing space, prayer, and song with the gathered people of God.

I do have some good news for us. The Session has been prayerfully discerning how and when we can start bringing people back into the sanctuary for worship, and **the Session recently adopted a phased approach to returning to in-person worship that will begin on July 19 at 10:00 a.m.** We will have space for around 50 worshippers each Sunday, and there will be a system for signing up to come to worship. If things go well for a few weeks and if we have the proven ability to sanitize the sanctuary, then we will consider returning to two services.

Last month almost 250 of you responded to an online survey about the life of the church in this pandemic. Thank you for sharing your opinions. One of the questions was about what concerned you the most about returning to in-person worship. By far the top concern was others not wearing a mask or practicing social distancing (78%). The next two were the number of people in attendance (59%) and pre-existing health conditions (26%). We believe the plan for returning to worship seriously addresses these significant concerns.

Being wise and safe in how we handle ourselves is going to be essential. Our top concern should be considering how to keep others safe and healthy, which aligns well Jesus' command that we should love our neighbors as ourselves. We are making sacrifices in order to preserve and promote the well-being of our neighbors. I also strongly urge all considering a return to worship to take a good look at your own health and susceptibility to getting sick. Worship matters, but if each individual doesn't take

What to Expect for In-Person Worship

- Everyone will be wearing facemasks.
- People will sign-up the week prior to the service.
- Seating will be assigned to promote social distancing.
- All worship aids will be on the screen.
- There will be music but no congregational singing.
- There will be no nursery, no children's programming, and no coffee hour.
- Efforts will be made to make all the elements of the service no-contact.

Dear Church Family,

I'm tired and I bet you are too. There are times I'd like hide away in a hole in order to turn off my anger about systemic racism, COVID-19, or not being able to see my family in Seattle this year. I know it's perfectly fine and necessary to take a mental break. It's called a Sabbath. There is a difference, however, between taking a Sabbath and avoiding God's call to love our neighbors.

It's easy to avoid thinking about COVID-19 when our beaches are once again crowded. It's easy to avoid thinking about systemic racism as worldwide protests are no longer the major headlines. The reality, however, is that systemic racism and COVID-19 are still with us and only one can be made better by a vaccine. As followers of Jesus Christ we are called to "do justice, love mercy and walk humbly with God." (*Micah 6:8*). It can be overwhelming wondering how any of us can make a difference in regard to systemic racism. Each one of us can start by listening and learning from people of color. Many of us have participated in the 21-Day Race Challenge where we've read, listened or watched resources by or about people of color. It doesn't seem like much, but it's a good place to start. The good news is that Myers Park Presbyterian Church, which organized the 21-Day Race challenge, has agreed to leave up all of the challenge resources on their website indefinitely (myersparkpres.org).

As for COVID-19 we can "love mercy" and "walk humbly with God" by sacrificing our own comfort by wearing a mask in crowded areas, especially indoors, for the health of others and by continuing to practice proper social distancing. It's an inconvenience, but when we're talking about protecting the health of others it's a small price to pay.

To summarize, it is perfectly fine to take a mental break or do whatever you need to do to be rejuvenated. We're all going to need it and we're only going to get it from Jesus Christ himself. The Christian life is not easy and many of us are finding this out more than ever during our present trying times. If we look at the Bible, however, all those who took their faith seriously had lives that were far from easy, and instead endured imprisonment, persecution and even death. But even in the midst of it all their faith was strengthened as they relied on Jesus Christ to keep moving forward. Let's be sure to do the same.

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Playground Fundraiser

This past winter the Session approved a plan to redo our two playground areas. We were set to begin fundraising for those playgrounds when COVID-19 hit the area. Now that we have had a couple of months to evaluate how things are going, we are ready to raise funds for this playground.

Update from the Session

Session met twice in June. Highlights from these meetings include:

- The adoption of a phased return to worship plan, with the initial Sunday for that return slated for July 19th at 10:00 a.m.
- The renaming of the Adult Education Committee to the Faith Formation Committee, which is a more accurate title for the breadth of ministry performed by this committee.
- The redesignation of the youth mission deposit to mission support for Wayfinder Missions, the organization that plans and hosts international mission trips.
- Continued discussion on how to best support Joyful Noise and its staff this summer as they return to work with lower enrollment.
- The decision to proceed with fundraising for the planned play yard improvements, which was slated to begin the week Covid-19 stopped everything around us.

It is our joy to serve Christ as the Session for First Presbyterian Church. Please continue to hold us in your prayers.

Continuing to Grow Together

Nine years ago I read *It Starts At Home: A Practical Guide to Nurturing Lifelong Faith* by Kurt Bruner and Steve Stroope. They offered the powerful image of a hand holding budding flowers with the bare roots dangling free. They said, if they, as parents, (the hand lovingly and tenderly holding the flowers) brought their children (the beautiful and delicate flowers) to church to have them 'watered' in faith can you imagine how that would go? Picture for a minute: the watering can pouring water over the flowers, the water running down the stems and off the roots. Without a pot or soil the flowers cannot drink any of the water. The pot (home) and soil (adults in the childrens' life) are essential components to helping the flowers (children) grow and thrive in their faith. This image has always stuck with me.


Here at First Presbyterian we are so fortunate to have kids who come from an enriched environment. During this time of COVID, families have grown deeper in their faith together. Young families have embraced weekly Bible story times and activities, and the Youth families have engaged in spiritual practices, in ways that weren't possible with pre-COVID hectic schedules. This time of COVID has not been lost-time for the faith of our families, but rather a time of growth and expansion. The increased time and engagement together offers a new image: a larger pot (more time at home) and enriched-soil (families centered in faith). The flowers are flourishing.

I have been so encouraged by the stories families have shared about the new ways and spaces they are engaging with God. A Christ-centered family always has been, and always will be, the most important component to children's faith development. As we come back together I hope we can continue to share our faith stories. Together building a strong Christ-centered community, where we are an active part of enriching and encouraging one another-- to continue to grow and flourish in our faith.
