Worship has been and will always be the hub of life of First Presbyterian Church. I've been thinking about worship a lot during this pandemic because we've had to worship in entirely new ways. In this Tidings I wanted to offer some thoughts on worship, why we do what we do, why it matters, and what thinking goes into the worship choices we make. I hope you find this informative and even helpful as you prepare for worship.

What is worship? Why does it matter?

In The Book of Order, we have an entire section devoted to worship – what it is, its ordering, and what its roots are. I'd invite you to read it sometime. It's lovely and rich. Among its treasures is this, "To be Christian is to worship Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord. To be a member of Christ's body, the Church, is to share through Word and Sacrament in the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit" (W-1.0107). We worship in response to the Triune God's gift of grace to us. We worship because we are human and God created us to do so. It is necessary for us because it tends to our whole selves (body and spirit) and because it reorients our lives around God's message of grace and love.

Why does our worship follow a specific order?

Our worship follows a pattern that happens every Sunday – Gathering, Hearing the Word, Responding to the Word, and Sending. This pattern occurs in both styles of our worship. The Gathering includes the prelude, Call to Worship, music, and confession. All of this is because God calls us to worship and offers us grace right off the bat. This grace puts us in a position to Hear the Word – from reading of Scripture to preaching, this is at the heart of worship. We believe that God speaks through the Scripture and the preacher, so we should pay attention! Then, we respond. We do this with singing, with our tithes and offerings, and with the sacraments (communion and baptism). These responses, particularly the sacraments, are also at the heart of worship. Finally, we are sent from the service into the world for mission. This involves singing, a charge and benediction, and a postlude. So, why follow this order? It's a regular reminder of the gospel story in our lives – call, forgiveness, gospel, response, and mission. This is why the whole service matters – not just the sermon or music!

Why do we worship the way we do?

There are lots of answers to this question. Some of it is because we are Presbyterian, and this is part of our Reformed theological understanding of worship. Some of it is because we are humans who create culture (like God told us to do!), so we write music, create liturgy, and build churches that reflect God's call on us. What is interesting is that God has given freedom to worship in many different ways. Worship style is important, but if we are hung up only on what we like or don't like about worship style, then we're missing the mark. We worship the way we do because this is

Dear Church Family,

It's the month of Thanksgiving, but if I'm being completely honest I'm having a hard time being thankful. Normally we'd have family come in from out of town, but COVID-19 put the kabash on that. Adding insult to injury, it'll soon be a year and a half since I've been able to see my family in Seattle. Our normal rhythms are out the window making everything feel off-balance. It's going to be difficult to recreate the magic of having family from out of town at the Thanksgiving table without said family.

Every night with our kids, Matt and I say the Lord's Prayer, but before we say "Amen" we name one thing we're thankful for in order to help our kids get into the habit of practicing thankfulness. I'm realizing, however, the practice of naming one thing I am thankful for has been just as important for me as it's been for our kids. My kids will tell Jesus they're thankful for simple things such as "laughing with friends" or "our nice kitty." My items of thankfulness have also been just as simple: "Thank you, Lord that Daddy, Phoebe and Jenson are healthy" or "Thank you, Lord that we live in a warm house." But are they really "just" simple? Health is not something to be taken for granted these days and with so many out of work neither are our homes. When I'm scrambling to be thankful it's been helpful to think of the small things such as my kids laughing at the dinner table or things I take for granted such as our health and our home that help me muster up any sense of gratitude.

In regards to our faith maybe it would help if we concentrate on the aspects of our faith that we tend to take for granted such as: *"For God so loved the world he gave his one and only son so that all who believe in him would not perish, but have everlasting life."* --John 3:16. If you've ever memorized any scripture I bet you've memorized this one. Let's pause and think about what this means for us today. God gave himself in Jesus Christ to restore the world. In Jesus we see the lengths to which God will go not just to restore our world, but to give us hope while the world continues to disappoint us. We only see glimpses of Christ's redemption until Christ returns, but glimpses are enough to remind us there's a brighter light of hope at the end of the tunnel. And even now that light helps us to keep putting one foot in front of the other. The tunnel eventually ends, but until then Christ gives us what we need to keep going forward. When Jesus rose from the dead he claimed himself as the final say, taking it away from the darkness, hopelessness and brokenness that seeks to keep us trapped in despair.

This is why the good news of Jesus Christ is good news. Not even COVID-19 or all that we are mourning can change what Jesus did on the cross. For you, for me and for all of us. Christ is still our light that shines in the darkness. The darkness we face in life will present itself in different forms: In the loss of relationships, health or stability etc. But the light of Christ remains the same and will continue to shine in whatever type of darkness comes our way. Sometimes the light of Christ is as bright as a spotlight. Other times it's more like a candle barely burning at the end of its wick. It's light nonetheless and even though it's barely a flame it continues to be our beacon in the darkness and for this we can be thankful.

In-Person Worship Update

Our concern is growing over the spread of COVID-19 and increasing positivity rates. We believe that we have safe practices in place for worship and other gatherings, but that does not mean that there is not risk involved in gathering. For now, we continue to plan to hold in-person worship, monitored on a week-by-week basis. Communication is made via email, Sunday worship announcements, and through social posts. As a reminder, here is what to expect for in-person worship:

- Everyone must wear a facemask.
- Reservations must be made the week prior to the service (capacity is limited to 50).
- Seating is assigned to promote social distancing.
- All worship aids are on the screen.
- There is music but no congregational singing.
- There is no nursery, no children's programming, and no coffee hour.
- Efforts are made to make all elements of the service no-contact.
- At the end of the service, worshipers remain seated until dismissed by an usher.

How to Sign Up for in-Person Worship

Signing up to attend worship happens on a weekly basis, beginning at 9 a.m. on the Monday before the service you wish to attend. To sign up, call the church office (616-842-6760).

If you don't have a reservation, please do not show up on Sunday morning hoping there is space for you. Space is limited and seating is assigned.

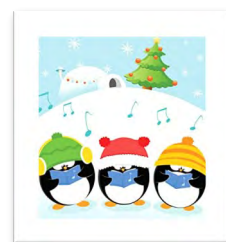

Phishing—Don't Get Snagged!

It seems like there is always some kind of scam out there waiting to snag you—our Information Technology specialist, Tina Ramones, has some helpful tips to help you avoid them.

Phishing vs. Spear-Phishing

There's phishing and then there's spear-phishing and neither one involves a boat, water, or (yuck!) worms. However, both techniques hope to make an on-line catch of your confidential information.

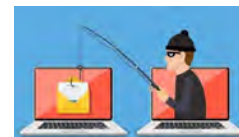
Phishing is a broader term for any attempt to trick victims into sharing sensitive information such as passwords, usernames, and credit card details for malicious reasons. The attackers often disguise themselves as a trustworthy entity and make contact with their target via email, social media, phone calls, and even text messages.

Spear-phishing attackers focus on those who put personal information on the internet. From a social media profile (like Facebook or Twitter), they will be able to glean a person's email address, friends list, geographic location, and any posts about new gadgets that were recently purchased, or where and when you are going on vacation. With this information, the attacker would be able to send a convincing but fraudulent message to their target. Once they have a foot in the door, it is very hard and sometimes very costly to close it.

Tips to Avoid a Spear-Fishing Attack:

- **Watch what personal information you post on the internet:** Look at your online profiles. How much personal information is available for potential attackers to view? Most importantly become familiar with and use privacy and security settings on your social media platforms to limit what others can see.
- **Have smart passwords:** Every password that you have should be different from the rest – passwords with random phrases, numbers, and letters are the most secure.
- **Do not casually click links in emails:** My personal policy is to **NEVER** click on an email link unless I was given prior notification by the sender.

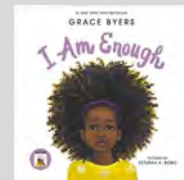

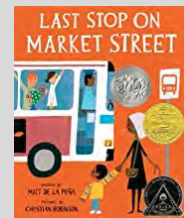
New on Seesaw: Story Time

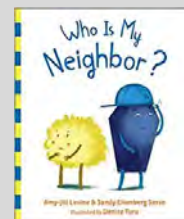
