From Reverend Troy Hauser Brydon

THESE are challenging times we're living in. The pandemic has worn us down. The reckoning of race and violence is constantly on our minds. The partisanship stoked both by politics and media is at a fever pitch. The church sits in the midst of this challenge, tossed this way and that in trying to understand when to speak, when to act, and when to let things go.

I've been meeting regularly with the new Senior Pastor of Westminster Presbyterian in Grand Rapids, the Rev. Lynette Sparks. These meetings are a chance for us to compare notes on the state of ministry and to help our churches be good partners in ministry. They also give me the opportunity to bounce ideas off of another wise soul. We met this past week and talked about how it's our work as pastors to shape *how* people think, not so much to dictate *what* people think. That is, pastors are meant to train their people to think Christianly about the world and the issues of our times, not to tell you exactly what to think on this or that issue.

Hebrews 6:19 gives us this wonderful image, "We have this hope as an anchor for the soul, firm and secure." An anchor keeps a boat fixed and secure, but it does not keep the boat from moving this direction or that. The boat can drift right or left, forward or backward, but it is always secured to what will keep it safe. I view Christianity that way, and it is very much our Presbyterian theology and heritage to allow latitude for differences of conviction while staying secure to our one Lord, Jesus.

Beginning this month, our sermons will explore this theme of conviction and differences living together. We're calling the series "Better Together," which I think describes one of the greatest witnesses our church can provide in world where it's easier to find like-minded people to worship with and to break off

relationship with those with whom we disagree. We can be better, and we can be a part of turning around the brokenness of partisanship in our country. We won't ever be perfect at it, but thank God that Jesus is the anchor for our soul! Thank God that we have the tools for reconciliation and forgiveness. I look forward to growing with you in this, as we mature together as Christians, letting the Holy Spirit make us more Christlike.

Dear Church Family,

On April 21st, many let out a collective sigh of relief when the verdict of the Derek Chauvin trial was announced. Many rejoiced that justice was finally served. There are those who mourn the growing distrust of our police force and those who believed Chauvin did what he was trained to do. Regardless of how you feel about the outcome. I would like us as a church to listen to how the African-American community is responding to the verdict. We as Christians are called to listen to those who are hurting and oppressed. This is what Jesus did and he received a lot of backlash for it—even from his own disciples. When he spoke with the woman at the well who belonged to an ethnicity that Israel looked down upon, even she was stupefied that he would take the time to speak with her. The disciples were also aghast at his actions (John 4:7-29). He was criticized for healing a man's shriveled hand on the Sabbath. In doing so Jesus challenged those who believed upholding the law of the Sabbath was more important than saving a life (Matthew 12:9-14). He conveyed the same message when once again on the Sabbath, but this time on the steps of the

synagogue, he healed a crippled woman (Luke 13:10-14). Jesus shared meals with "sinners and tax collectors," the social pariahs of his day (Mark 2: 13-17).

While I can't completely identify with what the African-American community is feeling, as an Asian American and as a person of color, I had a visceral reaction to the murders of the Asian women in Atlanta, as well as to the multitude of other videos of Asian Americans being harassed and/or brutally attacked in recent weeks. In many of those videos I see my family, my Asian-American friends and myself. I can only imagine what a black person experiences every time they see on the news yet another video of a black person roughly treated or even killed at the hands of those who were sworn to serve and protect. I'm not saying that every police officer is racist. There are many good men and women in the police force, who take seriously their oath to protect all people, regardless of their background. What I am saying, however, is that the majority of African Americans are hurting, afraid and exhausted. It is our responsibility as followers of Christ to do what Jesus did: Listen. Care. Empathize. Advocate. To not

be so quick to judge, but to take the time to listen and learn about why our fellow humans are hurting. These are people who Jesus loves and for whom he also gave his life.

If you're new to the journey of learning and listening to African American voices I'd like to suggest a few books: Just Mercy by Bryan Stevenson, founder of the Equal Justice Initiative; and *The Color of* Compromise or How to Fight Racism by Jemar Tisby, best-selling author and co-founder of The Witness: A Black Christian Collective. Although he is not African American, I'd also recommend America's Original Sin by Jim Wallis, a renowned Christian author, speaker and proud MSU grad. This is by no means an exhaustive list, but this is a good place to start. I'm also always happy to be a conversation partner. Today the church is at a crucial point in history where we will either be remembered for being a witness to the justice of Jesus Christ or being compliant with oppressive powers with our silence. I pray it's the former rather than the latter.



Special Pentecost Offering

"O God from my youth you have taught me, and I still proclaim your wondrous deeds." Psalm 71:17

On Pentecost Sunday, May 23, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit. This celebration is marked by receiving one of the four PC(USA) special offerings. The Pentecost Offering helps nurture the faith of those who are the future of the church—children, youth, and young adults.

- 40% of the offering remains with First Presbyterian Church to support children. This year it will be given to the Joyful Noise Christian Childcare Scholarship Fund. The fund helps families pay tuition at the childcare center when an unexpected financial burden or crisis occurs.
- 25% supports ministries with youth ages 12-18. This includes such things as support for the planning of the 2022 Presbyterian Youth Triennium and funding grants for graduating seniors to explore their next steps in faith and vocation.
- 25% supports Young Adult Volunteers experiences. The funds help train and equip volunteers to engage in mission at more than 20 sites in the U.S. and around the world as well as providing funds for retreats, events, and counseling to help young adults discern God's call.



• 10% supports the "Educate a Child, Transform the World" national initiative affirmed at the 221st PC(USA) General Assembly to improve the quality of public education.

We are planning to hold an outdoor worship service in the Lynne Sherwood Waterfront Stadium on Sunday, July 18. This is a great opportunity to worship in this beautiful space, for those who aren't comfortable with indoor worship during the pandemic, and to invite friends and neighbors to see how wonderful it is to be a part of First Presbyterian. The worship service will be followed by Sundaes on Sunday, so come hungry!

Earth Care Team

This month's article deals with the church building and our efforts to reduce its impact on the environment and lower building operating costs. Often, it is not recognized that a Green Building significantly lowers expenses while contributing to a healthier environment for each of us.

We have accomplished a significant number of activities to create a building which has a smaller environmental footprint. Many are listed below.

- We performed a preliminary energy audit to determine where our efforts will produce the greatest benefit.
- Lighting has mostly been changed over to LED lights as these require only one-tenth the amount of electricity as an incandescent bulb and one-half of the CFL.
- We are testing infra-red sensors to replace manual light switches allowing lights to automatically turn off when no one is in the room.
- Rooftop-mounted solar panels have also been investigated and may be an option for us in the future.
- We have adjusted recycling as much as possible and are investigating other services to recycle additional items used within our building.
- You have all recognized the switch to reusable cups for coffee between services. Reusable items are also being utilized by our youth groups.
- Cleaning products utilized within our building are non-toxic.
- A bike rack has been placed outside our south entrance to encourage non-motorized transportation to and from church services and activities.

We will continue working on other areas of our building in the future and hope our members will do the same in their homes.

Update from the Session

- Approved several new at-large committee members
- Approved receiving the allowable draw for the Omega Fund from the GHACF
