From Reverend Dr. Troy Hauser Brydon

It's the time of year where we turn our attention to pledging our resources towards the coming year's ministry. The good news is that we are seeing much of what we expect in ministry coming back into action. It feels so delightful to see so much ministry going on around our building and grounds. After a year and a half with so much delayed or changed, it is great to see people engaging in a wide variety of ministries supported by our church.

The theme of this year's Generosity Campaign is Resilience. I think that's a great word for our church in this season. The first definition of resilience is "the capacity to recover quickly from difficulties." I have seen our church live out this type of resilience throughout 2021. We have adjusted. We have made extra connection. We have worked hard to be the kind of church God is calling us to be. The second definition for resilience is "the ability of a substance or object to spring back into shape." I'm bearing witness to that kind of resilience, as every Sunday morning is beginning to feel a bit more like it used to feel. Surely this church has changed a bit over the past year, and I am eager to have God use us both for who we've been and for who we are becoming. I see both at play.

In the coming days you will receive our annual Generosity appeal in the mail. I hope that you take time reading through its pages and praying for the ministries of the church. I hope that you consider how God has blessed you and how this church plays a part in your life and in this community. Then I hope you'll return your pledge card to the church to help our leadership have a clear understanding of the resources we will have as we plan ministry for 2022. Pledges are always estimates, so don't feel stuck with your pledge. You can always call us and adjust it up or down if life changes. Know that I am so grateful for this church's faithful generosity!

Switching gears, you are well aware that around 100,000 displaced Afghans who assisted the United States over the past two decades will be needing homes in the U.S. Our state is receiving around 1,300 of God's children, and I'd like for our congregation to consider sponsoring one such family. So, on Sunday, October 17, at 3:00 there will be a meeting at the church to gauge the interest of the congregation. I hope we will find it in our hearts to be supportive of this good, Christian work, but it begins with seeing if there is interest. Please mark your calendars and join us. This kind of work is a clear response to the challenge of the gospel in our times.

Finally, I want to thank the congregation for your continuing sensitivity to caring for one another during this pandemic. So many of you eagerly lined up to get vaccinated, which has made some of our decision-making a bit

Dear Church Family,

I must confess I'm having a hard time letting go. Letting go of summer. This morning I was angry about having to wear closed-toe shoes. It doesn't help that the forecast still includes summer-like weather. It's like nature is saying: "Hang onto these short glimpses of warmth because frigid temperatures and grey are coming your way." Usually I love fall, but I'm just not ready for it this year. I realize that whether I'm ready or not, the change of seasons is inevitable.

Just as nature has her seasons so does life. We go through seasons of raising infants to toddlers to deciphering the moods of a teenager in what seems like a blink of an eye. We go through seasons of ups and downs in our marriages. We go through periods of being committed to healthy eating to giving in to the whim of every craving. We also experience different seasons in our spiritual lives. Times of feeling close to God to times of wondering if God is really listening. Some seasons in life are inevitable such as our kids growing up, but other seasons are dependent upon our willpower (or lack thereof). At times we're good about making good choices for our health. other times we lack the discipline to keep up those choices. There are seasons when we are consistent in our personal prayer lives and seasons when we'd rather read a good book then spend time in prayer.

Knowing this makes me even more thankful that God's faithfulness is not dependent upon our faithfulness (or lack thereof). Jesus Christ's love for us is consistent even when we are not. Scripture reminds us of this:

Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever. - Hebrews 13:8 'I am the Alpha and the Omega,' says the Lord God, who is and who was and who is to come, the Almighty. --Revelation 1:8

None of these verses are followed up with statements such as: "Unless you fail to love God perfectly." These passages simply state who God is. Jesus Christ is the same Jesus Christ who loves us and forgives us when we are in the midst of joyful or dark seasons of life. The God who created the world, the God who walks with us even when we refuse to walk with him, and the God who comforts us when we are hurting are all one and the same God who never changes.

While we will inevitably experience different seasons in life, how comforting it is to know that our constant is Jesus Christ whose faithfulness never changes.

Recycling Tips From the Earth Care Team

The Earth Care Team will be offering tips for recycling in the coming months. We will start with Plastic. However please know that the best alternatives are still to CONSUME less plastic to recycle in the first place.

Home recycling requires a trivial amount of time, yet offers substantial benefit to the homeowner as well as the environment. According to the EPA, the national recycling rate is just 30%.

Close the Loop: Buy Recycled!

The value of recyclables is driven by market demand. As consumers, we must choose products with recycled content and packaged in recycled materials, so that the materials we recycle are put to use, and markets are sustained.

Plastic

Plastic does not break down in landfills, and since it can be recycled to make many diverse products, effort should be made to recycle all plastic waste. To make best use of plastics, consumers should choose the types of plastics that lend themselves most to reuse and recycling options. Recycling centers vary in the types of plastic they accept. Check with your local recycling center, and take care to buy plastic goods that are recyclable.

Plastic goods are assigned different numbers to grade them for recycling: #1 (PET) and #2 (HDPE) for containers, #4 (LDPE) for bags, #7 for mixed plastics such as polycarbonates that are not recyclable. Almost all recycling centers accept plastics #1 and #2.

- **Plastic Bottles:** Plastic bottles are usually made of #1 PET plastic, a valuable recyclable material. Among many other items, this plastic can be "spun" into fleece fabric. Tops should be removed before recycling, and put in with your general plastic items. Polycarbonate baby bottles (#7 plastic) are not recyclable. Because it is difficult to clean PET plastic without releasing harmful chemicals, bottles made of PET should not be reused.
- **Plastic Grocery Bags:** Most grocery bags are made of high-density polyethylene, a Type 2 recyclable plastic. Most grocery stores and recycling centers now have bins where customers can drop off used plastic bags for recycling.
- **Polystyrene (#6):** Polystyrene (#6) (cups, food trays, egg cartons, etc.) does not biodegrade. Ask if your recycling center accepts polystyrene for recycling; many now accept this material. Try to reduce your use of this material.
- **Plastic #5 Polypropylene: One of the Least Recyclable Plastics:** Considered one of the safest plastics, #5 plastic is used for packaging items such as yogurt, cottage cheese, margarine, and vitamins, and is contained in food wraps and bottle tops. It is one of the least expensive plastics to make. However, the process of recycling plastic #5 is less efficient than other plastics, and the end result has little market value. To avoid the waste associated with #5, choose products packaged with plastic #2 (HDPE). Many companies, especially those selling organic food, have switched to plastic #2, a better (but more expensive) alternative. Alternatively, find out if your community has an All Plastics Recycling program that accepts plastic #5 or set aside your plastic #5 containers for reuse.




