From Reverend Dr. Troy Hauser Brydon

Over the course of my ministry I have become convinced that being intentional about legacy is essential both to how we live intentionally as Christians now and to how those who have come before us have paved the way for us. Legacy is important because it speaks to how we have lived our days. Legacy giving is also vital to the church because it strengthens and grows ministry in good times and cushions the church in hard times.

I am delighted that the Rev. Dr. John Buchanan will be spending time with us on Sunday, September 26 in the afternoon to talk to us about why legacy is so important to the church. John served as the pastor of Fourth Presbyterian Church in Chicago from 1985-2012. Fourth is one of the flagship churches in our denomination, right across the street from the John Hancock Building on Michigan Avenue. He also was the editor of *The Christian Century* until 2016. During his time at Fourth, he oversaw significant development of legacy planning and giving. I know he has much to say about it, and I hope you will take time to join us for this special afternoon in September. It has been one of my aims as your pastor to grow our legacy awareness and giving. I'd love to see you there, and I'd love to see your

From Rev. Kristine Aragon Bruce

Dear Church Family,

Thank you for all of the cards, calls, texts and prayers for me and my family in the loss of my Auntie "Baby" Joan and Uncle Marceo. Your words and prayers mean the world to me.

Auntie Baby was my mom's older sister. My Lola (grandmother in Filipino) passed away suddenly when my Auntie Baby was only 14 and my Mom was 12. They had 4 younger siblings. My Auntie Baby became the mother figure for her younger siblings overnight. Until the day she went into the hospital, my aunties, uncles and cousins continued to lovingly joke about how much of an overbearing mom she tended to be. Uncle Marceo was

an engineer and fit almost every stereotype of one. He was intelligent, quiet and utterly devoted to my Auntie Baby and she to him. He had suffered a debilitating stroke 15 years ago and my Auntie was his sole caregiver. They passed away within hours of one another due to Covid-19. Their passing brings new meaning to the vow: "Till death do us part."

Grief is a funny thing. Funny because you just don't know how or when it's going to hit you. There is no rhyme or reason. I literally studied the grieving process in seminary so it's strange to recognize what is happening to me mentally, emotionally and physically. One second you'll just be going about your day, brewing your morning coffee

(or in my case tea), making sure the kids have everything they need in their backpacks, and suddenly a song, a picture or maybe even nothing at all jolts you back into the reality that you are experiencing a deep loss. Our first reaction is to try and keep the tears at bay. To tell ourselves "C'mon... you need to keep it together." But why?

I made it through my Auntie and Uncle's homily without crying. I did the same thing when my Mom passed away five years ago. But when it came time to drop flowers into their graves I let grief take over. I knelt and I sobbed. A little voice screamed: "GET IT TOGETHER! Get up! You're making a spectacle of yourself!" But I didn't listen. Instead I listened to my need to stop shoving

name on the Ferry Legacy Tree outside of the sanctuary, joining the chorus of saints who believe First Presbyterian's ministry is worthy of our support in life and beyond.

Also, I am excited about returning to a more typical style of ministry this fall. Of course, I understand Covid is still a reality and that our children below the age of 12 have not been eligible for vaccines. While doing what we can to make our ministry and building as safe as possible, it is also time to do what we can to tend to our spiritual lives. We will continue to offer worship online and have some other ministries available online or in a hybrid format, but I really hope that you can join us in person again as soon as you are ready to do so. The community of saints gathered for worship, study, prayer, and fellowship cannot be fully replicated online. As a church, my hope is that we will do what we can to welcome each other as best we can this fall.

To that end, allow me to write practically and do a little theology with you all as it relates to Covid precautions. First, here's how our Covid Response Team is approaching the fall. For our children's and youth programming, we will follow the lead of the schools. For now, that means that leaders and participants in those ministries will wear masks. For the rest of the church life (meetings, classes, worship, etc.) we encourage you to discern what is best for yourself and the community. Health officials are encouraging vaccinations and masking where possible, so it is our hope that you follow suit, particularly in this moment where community spread is on the rise and where we are trying to do what we can to ensure our children have a good school year not interrupted by quarantines. While we are encouraging this responsibility, we are leaving the decision to your best discernment. Masks are welcome!

Second, let me write just a little from a theological perspective on all of this. As Christians, our personal freedoms are always submitted to our relationships within community. In 1 Corinthians 12, Paul uses the image of the body of Christ. He writes, "For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ (1 Cor. 12:12). A body at war with itself is not healthy. A body where the individual members put their own freedoms above the whole cannot be healthy. The consistent view of New Testament ethics is that our individual behaviors and convictions come under the Lordship of Jesus and promote the peace, unity, and purity of the church. Part of that means that we make sacrifices for each other. Part of that means, sometimes, that we make choices for the good of the whole even though we may not personally be in that space.

While I have certainly kept up on the science, I can tell you that my chief reason for getting vaccinated and for wearing a mask where appropriate is to promote the health and welfare of others around me. So, as you approach life this fall, I encourage you to consider the welfare of others. I know I am so eager to welcome children and others back to the church, and if wearing a mask is what it takes to get them here safely, I will gladly do it. Let's be the kind of community that is Christlike. Again, in Paul's words, "Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others" (Phil. 2:4).

the grief as deep down as possible. It took too much strength to do so and I was done. So I flat out ugly cried with reckless abandon.

And guess what? It felt good to do it. I'm not saying I'm completely over my loss, but what I am over is not allowing myself to grieve. I'm sharing this with you, church family, because I hope you are giving your-

self permission to feel. To not give into the voice that says: "Get it together!" Get it together for what and for whom?

Christ went through death in order to defeat it. With Jesus Christ we can get through the darkness of pain and not be overcome by it. Sometimes it takes being in the darkest of places to realize just how bright the light of Christ is.

"The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it."--John 1:5

The Bible is the most purchased and possibly the least read 'book' in America. Much of this lack of readership is due to the incongruity and misconceptions created when reading the Biblical stories within the context of our modern worldview. Christianity for Today is a newly forming discussion group to examine how we can understand Christianity within the context of our modern worldview as successors to the Renaissance and the Enlightenment. We will be investigating whether there can be harmony between Christianity and our present age of big bang cosmology, evolution, unveiling of the human genome, and general skepticism. In doing so, our goal will be to develop new relationships and community here at FPGH.

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

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PEACE & GLOBAL WITNESS SPECIAL OFFERINGS

On World Communion Sunday, October 3, we celebrate our togetherness around the globe at the communion table in God's house. Through the gifts of the Peace and Justice Special Offering received that day, the Presbyterian Church (USA) is extending Christ's peace



throughout our community and the world to over 100 countries. It is a stand against violence to remind everyone that the peace of Christ brings healing and hope.

- 25% of the giving for this offering will stay here at FPGH to support Step Up agency in Muskegon. Step Up helps support young adults who have aged out of the traditional foster care system and are on their own.
- 25% is given to mid councils to unite congregations in supporting peacemaking in their regions.
- 50% supports the work being done for reconciliation and healing by Presbyterians across the globe. Cathy Chang, our mission co-worker in the Philippines whose assignment focuses on human trafficking, is one of those.

Survivors of Human Trafficking

The Hope Project of Muskegon serves survivors of human trafficking. It supports the healing of girls and women who have



survived sex trafficking and seeks to prevent further cases through mentoring and education.

Each month, seventeen volunteers from our church fill hygiene kits and write "faith notes." In past months our volunteers have filled over 50 kits with personal items for these survivors and have written notes with scriptural and personal messages for their strength. In August, Program Manager Rita Caviness and a survivor shared experiences of being trafficked, and ongoing struggles now during recovery. Both expressed their feelings that our church's welcome continues to help strengthen their recovery.

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From the Farth Care Team

"It is unequivocal that human influence has warmed the atmosphere, ocean and land..." so begins the 8/9/2021 Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change's 6th Earth Assessment report. PC(USA) Stated Clerk Rev. Dr. J. Herbert Nelson II preached the eve before the IPCC report was released. He said "This is our Father's world. We are tearing down the creation God has given us!"

How do we, Presbyterian Christians, make sense of these dire predictions?

Presbyterians for Earth Care (PEC) is a national eco-justice network (part of PCUSA Missions) that cares for God's creation by connecting, equipping and inspiring Presbyterians to make creation care a central concern of the church. PEC makes the following recommendations for responding to the IPCC report:

- 1) PRAY for discernment, understanding, imagination and courage to make changes for the future of our planet.
- 2) ACT by individually and corporately contacting our local, state, and federal representatives asking for bold and courageous plans and legislation to address current climate/ecological disasters and prevent worse problems.
- 3) TEACH others about stewardship of God's creation (and learn more ourselves)
- 4) SUPPORT your local congregation PEC




Sunday Evening Parent Group 5:30-7:15
