


One Great Hour of Sharing Special Offering

From Rev. Kristine Aragon Bruce

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Dear Church Family,

This is one of my favorite passages from the Bible: "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." Philippians 5:5-7.

As we approach Thanksgiving I've been thinking about thankfulness and what the Bible has to say about it, and this was the first passage that came to mind. This passage also comes to mind whenever I think about anxiety and the need for peace. At first it seems a bit strange that all three of these topics are found in one passage, but it actually makes perfect sense.

First of all Paul isn't saying that we shouldn't be anxious at all. Paul knows this best as he spent a good amount of time in prison and was eventually martyred. It's safe to assume that Paul experienced a great deal of anxiety in his life. What Paul is saying, however, is to present *every situation* with a spirit of thankfulness to God in prayer.

Not that we are to be thankful for our anxiety, but thankful about who God is. In Philippians 4:4 Paul says to "rejoice in the Lord always." Even in the midst of our anxiety we can be thankful for and trust in God's unwavering faithfulness and love for us. It's easier to do this when we tell God so in prayer.

Paul also encourages us to use our prayers as petitions - meaning we can and should share with God that we are anxious and what it is that is causing our anxiety. We're also invited to ask God for things to get better—whether it's a change for a particular situation or a change in our own perspective that will help us feel less anxious. When we do, we will experience the "peace of Christ that transcends all understanding." Christ's peace is beyond our understanding in that we will feel more at peace even if our situation has not changed (because sometimes it won't).

How can someone feel more at peace if he or she is still in a difficult situation? How can we possibly be at peace when we're still living in the midst of a pandemic? How can

one feel at peace when we hear about yet another outbreak in our schools? Peace comes by sharing with God what is giving us great anxiety while also sharing how thankful we are that Christ will never leave or forsake us. We may not feel that way, but thank God that God's actions aren't dependent upon our feelings. Christ remains with us even if we don't feel his presence. When we share with God in prayer what is causing us great anxiety with a spirit of thankfulness for who God is, we will receive and know Christ's peace. Peace from knowing that God is still with us. That God is the same God when life is great and is the same God when life is filled with anxiety.

In the midst of our excitement of potentially having a normal Thanksgiving where we can gather with friends and loved ones in person, I pray we are able to set time aside to be thankful for the faithfulness of Jesus Christ.



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UK Christians Walk 750 Miles to Urge Action on Climate Change

Headed to UN meeting in Glasgow, creation care advocates talk about what churches can do and what they are doing. KEN CHITWOOD|(From Christianity Today)

Rachel Mander's walk to Glasgow began with the Bible.

An evangelical from Sheffield, England, she had long been convinced of the connection between loving God and loving her neighbor. But when she was 19 or 20, she also saw the connection between loving her neighbor and caring for creation.

Then she couldn't stop seeing it.

"It's like looking for angels in the Bible," she said. "You don't notice how many there are until you actually look and then you see them popping up everywhere. Me and my friends started reexamining

Scripture and seeing how being a person of faith means you care for the environment. Suddenly, it was on every page."



Today, 24-year-old Mander is one of the co-leaders of a 750-mile relay-pilgrimage from the southwestern tip of the United Kingdom to Glasgow, Scotland, where this year's UN Climate Change Conference, known as COP26, will begin opening ceremonies on October 31.

The Young Christian Climate Network (YCCN) has organized about 2,000 people to make the walk. Convicted that the climate crisis is pressing, urgent, and must be resolved in this generation, they are pleading with church institutions, governments, and local congregations to take concrete steps to reduce carbon emissions.

They hope that their journey will raise awareness, rally people to the cause, and put pressure on governments to address the fact that burning fossil fuels has substantially increased the atmospheric concentrations of greenhouse gases, with serious negative consequences around the world.

November is Native American Month

We often think of Native Americans joining the earlier settlers for Thanksgiving. In reality, Thanksgiving was a yearly feast of the Indian Nations to celebrate the harvest. The settlers were invited to join in the celebration and this probably saved lives. Many of the early pilgrims died of diseases and hunger but many survived by the generosity of the area Indians.

Instead of "Indian," the preferred name now is "Native American." When the white settlers took over their lands they moved away and occupied new land areas. As more settlers came and took over more of their lands, wars followed with treaties being broken many times. Even so, many of the Native Americans helped the settlers and lived among them, but this was the exception rather than the rule. Eventually, many were put on reservations in land areas nobody wanted anyway.

Because of the many wars, warrior chiefs such as Sitting Bull and Crazy Horse became well known. Since the early times, Native Americans have served in the United States military. Some worked out the codes used during WWII which the enemies could not break.

The Native American peoples have

produced some great athletes like Jim Thorpe and Billy Mills, entertainers like Will Rodgers and present day leaders like Deb Hubbard who is the head of the U.S. Department of the Interior. We can celebrate many other accomplishments of Native Americans.

From the beginning, we as a nation have treated Native Americans very poorly, and we still do. Many Native Americans stay on the reservations to keep their customs alive, but some, seeking a good education, move off the reservation.

Take some time this month to learn more about the Native American way of life and the way they have been and are still being treated.
