# From Reverend Dr. Troy Hauser Brydon

I want to extend an invitation to worship to all of you this Advent and Christmas. By the time you are reading this, the first Sunday of Advent will have come and gone, but I want you to know that you are welcome to worship with us in this holy season of preparation. Being intentional about how you worship – whether with us in the sanctuary or using the livestream in your home – is part of how God speaks into your life at this time of year. I am concerned that the pandemic has disrupted life so much that the essential nature of worship has been consumed by busyness, disinterest, or fear. Let's combat that by being intentional about worship.

So, know that everyone is welcome to worship with us this Advent and Christmas, whether at home or in person. Now is the time to mark your calendars for the festive worship of this time of year. Of course, we'll have our normal **Sunday services** at 9:00 (Traditional) and 11:00 (Gathering) on December 5, 12, and 19. On Sunday evening on the 19th, at 5:00 p.m., we'll have our **Service of Light and Hope**. I've been in churches where this service is called "Blue Christmas," and it's a service that allows space for quiet, grief, and stillness, which are often things crowded out by the festivities of "the most wonderful time of the year." It's one of my favorite services, and I hope you'll join us.

We're changing things up a bit for **Christmas Eve** this year. Our Family Service featuring the Gathering Band and the Christmas Pageant will be at 4:00 p.m. Our hope is that this time allows for families to enjoy dinner and get their young ones to bed at a decent hour. Our Traditional Candlelight Service will be at 9:00 p.m. featuring the Geneva Choir and following a lessons and carols pattern. Finally, there will be a Holy Night Candlelight Service at 11:00 p.m. concluding with ringing in Christmas together.

On Sunday, December 26, we will have only one service at 10:00 a.m., where we can worship the newborn King Jesus together as one church family. So, please make your plans now. Also, invite others join in worship, whether that is online or in person. After missing each other's presence entirely last year, I know I am grateful that we will have at least some ability to share in this important time of year together.

Friends, it's been a challenging almost two years, but I have witnessed how strong our congregation is. God has blessed us beyond measure, and I am grateful to be shepherding you on this journey of faith. You remain in my prayers, and I hope to see you this season!

# From Rev. Kristine Aragon Bruce

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we begin another season of Advent when we look forward to the birth of Jesus Christ, I can't help but think about Mary. Luke 1:26-36 describes the moment when Mary is told by the Angel Gabriel that she is pregnant with Jesus.

Let me first just say that I'm a skeptic at heart. An ironic confession coming from a pastor, but there you have it. So whenever I read about someone in the Bible who immediately starts praising God after experiencing a traumatic and life altering event that is usually a result of something God has called them to do (I know all things are possible with Jesus. blah, blah, blah) I have to wonder: Did they really immediately start jumping for joy while singing God's praises? Or were they only able to do so after some intense sessions with their therapist?

I wonder the same things about Mary when she finds out she's been chosen to birth the Son of God into the world. She's probably only fourteen years old, engaged to be married and seemingly has a long and fruitful life ahead of her. But she's about to lose everything as the logical thing for her fiancé to do is leave her, since she's now carrying someone else's child and no longer a virgin. In Luke 1, however, Mary sings a song of praise and humbly accepts her role as the mother of the Messiah. She doesn't at all seem

worried about the consequences she will surely face having "conceived" out of wedlock.

She did, however, have Elizabeth to lean on. Elizabeth, who could also serve as Mary's confidant as she knew what it was like to have God do something impossible in your life. I like to think this is why Mary stayed with Elizabeth for three months so they could support one another in their moments of freaking out over the fact that God had just upended both of their lives. They would also have each other when they were in awe of the fact that God had chosen them to play monumental roles in God's grand plan for all of humanity. This comes back to a reoccurring theme for me in ministry and what God seems to be doing in my own life lately and that is this: When God calls us do something we are never asked to do it alone.

I pray more when I have a prayer partner. I read the Bible more when I have someone to study the Bible with. It's true for everything in my life. I run more when I have a running partner. I eat better if I have someone who promises to eat healthy with me. More than one person is needed if there is going to be any sort of encouragement, support, and accountability. I know that's all obvious, but so much harder to execute when push comes to shove.

Perhaps Elizabeth did serve as Mary's therapist so she could then launch into her song of praise. Luke doesn't give us any details. But what does matter is that Mary wasn't alone when she received this life altering call from God. She had a friend in Elizabeth who affirmed what a privilege it was to bear God's son into the world. It wasn't until after Elizabeth's affirmation of Mary that Mary broke out into that song of praise. Praising God not just for choosing her, but that God has proven yet again he has not forgotten his people, the poor, the lowly those that the rest of the world intentionally ignores.

None of us were ever meant to follow God alone. Mary had Elizabeth. Jesus had his disciples. Paul had Timothy. And through unlikely servants like Mary, we all have Jesus Christ who remains with us even during the times when we freak out over whatever he is calling us to do next. I think that's something worth singing about this Advent Season.

#### **Ouestions to Ponder:**

- 1. Who is your "Elizabeth?"
  What qualities would you need in a confidant who could help you to see all of God's blessings in your life?
- 2. If you had to write a "Song of Praise" to God what would you write about?

# In Our Church/In the Community

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### Christmas Traditions and Cultures in our World

As we prepare for Christmas celebrations in our church, homes, and with families with traditions that make our Christmases meaningful and personal, let's take a few moments to learn about our how our neighbors around the world celebrate the Christmas season with traditions they hold dear.

**Mexico:** Many Mexican families participate in their local church's annual *Posadas* ("the inn") processions from December 16 to Christmas Eve. There can be up to 9 processions during the season that commemorate Joseph and Mary's search for lodging. Houses along the procession route are decorated with evergreens, moss, and paper lanterns. Children carry candles and painted clay figures of Mary and Joseph. This celebration symbolizes the welcoming of Christ in the home and heart. Celebrations also include a Christmas play known as *Pastorelas* ("the shepherds"). Nativity scenes, known as the *Nacimiento* are very popular in Mexico. The figures of the *Nacimiento* are often passed from generation to generation and become well-loved family treasures.

**Honduras:** The Hondurans also host *Posadas* and *Pastorelas* thru the season, but the focus of Christmas centers around the *Noche Buena* ("the good night"), which is Christmas Eve. A large meal of roast pork, turkey, or chicken is served, along with apples and red grapes, *Rosquillas en Miel* (donuts soaked in honey) and a popular drink, *Rompopo* (similar to eggnog). Hondurans attend church services on Christmas Eve, wearing new clothes and shoes in celebration of the birth of Jesus. At midnight there are many firework displays which can last the entire night.

**Philippines:** With 80% of Philippine people being Catholic, Christmas is a very important holiday in the country. Church celebrations begin on December 16, when the first of nine early morning masses (*Misa de Gallo*) honoring Jesus' birth is held. One traditional Philippine custom is making a *parol*, a large bamboo pole topped with a lighted star lantern. Colored paper or cellophane paper in star patterns are placed on the top of the pole, representing the star that guided the Wise Men. Many citizens stay awake thru the night of Christmas Eve, attend the last of the nine Christmas masses, and follow this with a midnight feast also called *Noche Buene*. In the Phillipines, the *Noche Buene* is a large open-house celebration with family, friends, and neighbors, feasting on roasted pig, ham, fruit salads, rice cakes (*bibingka* and *puto bumbong*), steamed rice and a variety of drinks.

**Netherlands:** Christmas traditions in the Netherlands include *Sinterklaas Avond* (St. Nicholas Eve), and celebrations on Christmas Day and on Second Christmas Day. *Sinterklaas Avond* is celebrated on December 5 and is considered to be the eve of Sinterklaas' birthday. It is said that Sinterklaas journeys to the home of every child and leaves small gifts and treats to enjoy. Before they go to bed, children leave their shoes filled with hay, carrots, and sugar for Sinterklaas' horse. In the morning the horse treats have been replaced with gifts for the children. Christmas Day is known as *Eerste Kerstdag* in the Netherlands. This day is a time for quiet church services and traditional family meals. Santa Claus (*Kerstman*) may deliver small gifts, but most of the gift giving is done on St. Nicholas Eve. Second Christmas Day (December 26th) known as *Tweede Kerstdag*, is a day when people visit relatives or go shopping. Beautiful rustic decorations of pine and holly boughs, simple lights and candles adorn homes during the Christmas season. Christmas trees with lights and ornaments are also popular, much like in the U.S.

**Scotland:** You may be surprised to learn that there was a time in Scotland when Christmas didn't happen at all. During the Reformation in the 16<sup>th</sup> century, a ban on all Christmas celebrations was mandated. It wasn't until 1958 when Christmas Day again became a national holiday. Before 1560, Christmas in Scotland was called Yule, which was celebrated with many gifts, gatherings and feasts. Now many of the old traditions of the holiday have resurfaced and the traditional Christmas feast of turkey, Angus beef and Scottish lamb are served, along with Scotch broth, Cock-a-leekie soup, salmon, Scottish cheeses, Clootie dumpling, and Tipsy Laird (trifle with whiskey). Greens decorate homes to symbolize life during the dark winter nights, Yule logs are burned on the shortest day of the year to bring good luck and prosperity, while burning a Rowan tree branch was a way to clear bad feelings between family and friends. Celts brought the tradition of burning the Cailleach or "Old Woman Winter," a log carved with the face of an old woman to ward off bad luck. What can you do to put a little Scottish Presbyterian tradition into your Christmas this year?

# From the Earth Care Team & Mission Committee

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## **Carbon Neutrality**

Did you know that the PC(USA) General assembly of 2006 urged congregations and members to become carbon neutral? We've heard a lot about that topic this past month due to the COP26 climate conference in Glasgow.

#### What did the General assembly say?

- It strongly urges all Presbyterians immediately to make a bold witness by aspiring to live carbon neutral lives.
- It directs the General Assembly Council ...to inform all Presbyterians, governing bodies, and churches of the urgent need for them to reduce their energy consumption and of the injustice of our current energy practices.
- It calls upon all Presbyterians to take this seriously, to pray asking for God's forgiveness and guidance, to study this issue, to calculate their carbon emissions, to educate others, and to use less energy, striving to make their lives carbon neutral.

#### Briefly, what can we do as members of the PCUSA?

- We can calculate and reduce our carbon footprint. PC(USA) urges a goal of 4 tons per person, per year, close to the global average, but less than half of what a typical American family of four emits per person per year.
- Individual households can reduce their footprint by using LED lighting, opening windows instead of using air conditioning, better insulation in our homes combined with intelligent management of our home temperature, so that we use energy in late afternoon and evening after peak electrical loads are done for the day.
- We can consolidate longer automobile trips, and substitute biking or walking for short trips. This is particularly true in a compact community like Grand Haven where one can walk almost everywhere. Consider an electric bike, or even something as simple as wire-frame grocery carts so you can walk to the grocery store for your weekly shopping.
- We can purchase carbon offsets to compensate for the carbon we do use. In particular consider offsets that benefit indigenous people. For more information on carbon offsets, visit <u>terrapass.com</u>
- Recognizing that carbon footprint reduction on the larger national scale is primarily a political issue, consider supporting organizations that lobby for responsible energy use.
