From Reverend Dr. Troy Hauser Brydon

THE new year brings hope for what is to come and reflection for what has been. This year is no exception. Let me begin with reflection and make my way toward hope. So much has happened over the past twelve months. Vaccinations have led to a return to some normalcy to the rhythms of the church's life, but the pandemic has continued to influence much of what we do. At the end of my *Tidings* article a year ago I wrote these words, "Finally, as we turn into 2021, know that my prayers join yours as we pray for health, stability, and a return to being together." We certainly have partial answers to those prayers, but I'm going to keep praying them in 2022. I love you all, and I miss the simplicity of being with you, my sisters and brothers in Christ. Here's to trusting that in January 2023, I'm not praying the same prayer!

Upon reflection, some things are finding their footing once again. We'll have our annual **Congregational Conversation** on Sunday, January 23, at 10:00 in the Lounge and over Zoom. This is an opportunity for the members of the church to hear from the Session about the highlights of ministry in the previous year and to hear some of Session's plans for the coming year. It is also an opportunity for members to ask questions of the church leadership. We will have both a narrative and financial annual report available in time for the meeting. Much good ministry has happened in the last year, and I know Session is eager to share that news with you.

As has become our custom, Session has called a **Congregational Meeting** for the Sunday after the Congregational Conversation. On January 30, at 10:00, we'll hold this meeting for the purposes of voting on the Terms of Call for your pastors and to elect the at-large members of the Nominations Committee. You may recall that a year ago, we held our Congregational Conversations over Zoom, and we had our Congregational Meeting in the parking lot. At least some things are moving in the right direction!

The new year is not just for reflection. We also use it to cast our gaze forward, seeing what lies ahead. As I look ahead, I want to begin with gratitude for you. It has been my privilege to pastor a church that has weathered this pandemic with as much grace and generosity as this one has. I am friends with several pastors in the community, and our story of togetherness and grace is not universal. So, thank you. It's been a hard road, but we've made it this far by God's grace together.

Still, I foresee challenges that lie ahead for us. I want to name some of those in this article, and I ask you to pray for those challenges, asking God how you might respond to be a part of what God is doing among us.

Challenge #1—Our church functions with the talents, time, and creativity of its members. Many who have served faithfully through this hard season are tired, ready for a break, and needing some wind in their sails. We need new people willing to step forward to serve in the church. What ministry might God be calling you to?

Challenge #2—Almost two years of not participating at church in-person has left some of us wondering if coming to worship, a small group, or activity is worth it. The answer is, of course, "Yes!" Dear Church Family,

Happy New Year! I hope you had a wonderful Christmas and experienced once again the miracle of God coming to us as Jesus Christ. As we start a New Year I recognize that some of us may not be feeling as hopeful as we did in years past. A year ago we were feeling optimistic about the pandemic having less of a grip on our lives. We were looking forward to a new beginning and life returning to normal. I get the sense that most of us are starting 2022 exhausted and a lot less hopeful. To be perfectly honest this is how I feel. So where is Jesus in all of this?

It can be tempting to fall into the thinking of: "Will 2022 be a continuation of variants, potential shut downs and hundreds of thousands more falling ill or losing their lives?" I tend to think long term, which is both good and bad. In this case I find myself unhelpfully envisioning the worst for months to come. I've had to remind myself to take things day by day and sometimes moment by moment. Two types of prayers came to mind that would be helpful in doing just that. to ask for "this day our daily bread." Bread just for today - not for tomorrow, next week or next month. It's helpful to know that Jesus wants us to focus just on today. Just for today we focus on how God will give us what we need to get through the day. Just for today let's be on the lookout on how the Holy Spirit will show up. Just for today let's ask Jesus to give us the strength to put one foot in front of the other. Tomorrow has enough worries of itself and tomorrow we can ask God for more "daily bread" again. Until then let's just focus on who Jesus is today.

The Examen is an ancient prayer to be done at the end of the day. It consists of prompts to help us explore where we saw Christ at work that day. Prompts such as "When did I *today* feel closest to God?" and "When did I *today* feel the farthest away from God?" There are many variations of The Examen, but here is a general guide of how to pray this prayer:

1. *Become aware of God's presence.* Do this in a quiet space. Reading a Psalm or a favorite scripture passage can be helpful in making us more aware of God's presence. Psalm 18:1-2 is a great one.

- 2. *Review your day with gratitude.* There's always something to be grateful for!
- 3. *Pray about one aspect from the day.* Reflect when you felt close to God and when you felt far away.
- 4. *Notice and acknowledge your emotions.* Share those emotions with God.
- 5. *Look forward to tomorrow.* But try not to dwell on what tomorrow may or may not bring!

While I'm not a fan of New Year's resolutions I think it would be a great idea (just for this week to begin with) to start our day prayerfully asking God for daily bread and to end our day with the Examen. As I write this I am convicted of needing to be more aware of how Christ is at work within and around me. How about we do this together? And of course, take it day by day.

From the Racial Justice Committee

The Line

Most of us do not stop to think about historical events that have affected and shaped our present systems and culture. We just accept them because they have always been a constant in our lives. It's our way of life.

In 1619, twenty black slaves arrived to the English colony of Virginia, which planted the seed of racial injustice in this country. We've passed amendments to the U.S. Constitution to correct many of the injustices and have changed laws, but as one form of injustice is eliminated, other forms appear. The line of injustice moves, but there is always a line. Actions by state and federal governments locked most freed blacks into a lower tier of society. The promise of 40 acres and mule disappeared and sharecroppers replaced slaves. Blacks were placed in a subservient position and blocked from advancing in a

free society. Poll taxes plus literacy tests blocked their participation in government. New lines were drawn.

The GI Bill appeared in 1944 following WWII. This bill played a major part in reshaping the American scene. It gave veterans a major boost, building a sound financial future for themselves and future generations. It provided vets with low interest loans for homes, money for educational expenses, employment training, and other opportunities. Black vets were not specifically excluded from this program on paper, but in practice they were. The G.I. Bill provided very little or no help to the 1.2 million vets who were black. Individual states oversaw the distribution of funds, and in Mississippi, only 2 Blacks out of 3,200 received a VA guaranteed loan. The northern states were not much better. Redlining became another roadblock to financial success. Covenants were also used

against blacks. My parents purchased cemetery plots in the late 40's in the Grand Rapids area. In the purchasing agreement, it stated that no Blacks would be resting next to them.

I urge you to educate yourselves to get the true picture of what's happening in our present culture and time. For further reading, please read *Caste: The Origins of Our Discontents* by Isabel Wilkerson. Matthew 25 is also a great passage for Biblical support in serving and reaching out to the marginalized and oppressed. God created us in his image. Jesus accepts us no matter our color, race, economic status, educational level, etc. Let's not move the line. Let's erase it!


