The Body of Christ gathered outside at the Waterfront Stadium for worship was simply glorious! God blessed us with spectacular weather. We gathered en masse, with over 560 people in attendance. We enjoyed several hundred sundaes. It was just one of those days that puts a lot of wind in my sails.





As glorious as that day was, it also made me miss those days where the sanctuary was bustling with all of you. Sure, we've fared reasonably well over the two-plus years of the pandemic, but things are simply not the same without so many members and friends who have slipped away from worship. This church just isn't

what it should be without you gathered with others to hear the good news, to pray with each other, and to share life. Dear Church Family,

I just came back from an amazing week serving alongside some of our youth and their parents in Orange Walk, Belize. In Belize, we worked alongside our mission partners at Koinonia Ministries to help build a playground for older kids, spread gravel to improve the grounds at the Koinonia property (it's a lot harder and hotter than it sounds), and lead Vacation Bible School.

Koinonia Ministries began with a vision God gave to Pastor Ed Perez and his wife, Pastora Dyna. Long story short, Pastors Ed and Dyna took a leap of faith, followed the call God put on their lives, and began to do outreach ministry to children despite having no financial support from their denomination. They now minister to hundreds of kids and their families in Orange Walk and we have the privilege of partnering with them in ministry. In addition, young people are empowered to be leaders at Koinonia and in the community.

Pastors Ed and Dyna engage in ministry just as Jesus Christ did, which is to walk "alongside" others. Whether that is entering a young person's pain by hearing the stories of their dysfunctional home life or simply listening to their worries about their future. This is what's called relational ministry, where people walk alongside others to let them know they are not alone, and more importantly, that Jesus walks with them. I've heard and seen many ministries and churches convey the importance of relational ministry, but to actually execute it is a different story.

If you were to visit Koinonia Ministries (and I hope you do!) it would be easy to say Christ is more present in Orange Walk, Belize than here in Grand Haven. I found myself slipping into that mindset. But Pastor Ed reminded us that Jesus Christ does not belong to Koinonia Ministries or the nation of Belize. Christ is just as present here in Grand Haven as he is at Koinonia or anywhere else in the world. We just need to have eyes to see him at work.

Another thing that Pastor Ed said that has stuck with me is that if we aren't continuing to share our stories of how we see God at work in our daily lives then our churches will "be full of people who don't

truly know God." My hope and prayer for all of us is that we would have eyes to see God at work and the words to articulate how we experience Jesus Christ with us each and every day. Every evening our team shared where we saw God at work that day. Some shared they saw God in the smiles of the children we worked with that day. Another shared that we were able to get work done despite the scorching heat and humidity. Someone else shared they saw God in an impromptu Uno game with youth from Orange Walk and members of our mission team.

I'd like to end with that same question. A question that I hope we continually ask ourselves: "Where did you see God today?"

From the Earth Care Team Our Environment and the PCUSA General Assembly

Earth Care was a big issue for the General Assembly(GA) at their last meeting and action was taken to approve the following recommendations:

By Consent Agenda: (where many approvals are taken together with a single vote:)

- **ENV-11** urges protection of the diversity of creation with an emphasis on supporting the work and methods of indigenous people.
- **ENV-5** calls upon the entire PCUSA infrastructure to reduce its carbon footprint by 25% within the next 4 years.

By discussion and approval in the Plenary Session (where the delegates debate and deliberate):

- ENV-2 Approves and recommends a report, "Investing in a Green Future: a Vision for a Renewed Creation"; commits to a 10-year "turnaround decade" for restoring creation; and directs the Presbyterian Mission Agency to make restoring creation (including environmental justice, racial justice, and economic justice) a key priority in its Matthew 25 programming and in its advocacy.
- **ENV-4** establishes the principle that PCUSA travel will result in carbon offset contributions to an existing PCUSA fund, and that the fund will provide support for tree planting and re-forestation.
- **ENV-9** deals with fossil fuel issues, including guidelines for Mission Responsibility Through Investment (MRTI) that governs how the PCUSA invests based on environmental criteria, while also recognizing that employment within the fossil fuel industry is necessary for many and that divestment of fossil fuel companies is not to be considered a condemnation of their employment choices.
- ENV-10 establishes the procedures and practices to implement ENV-9 and other guidelines for MRTI.

A Letter from our Mission Co-Workers in South Sudan

Dear Members of First Presbyterian Church of Grand Haven,

Warm greetings to you in the name of our Savior! We hope that you are doing well. We want to thank you again for your faithful financial contributions and your prayers for our ministry in South Sudan. We are very grateful for you and your partnership with us in this ministry.

This is a difficult season in South Sudan. Food insecurity has reached crisis levels and there continues to be attacks and insecurity in many regions. The United Nations is no longer providing food aid to people who have been displaced, except in new emergency cases. Inflation is high and the government is months behind in pay-



ing salaries for civil servants. Please pray that God gives wisdom, faith, and love to the church here, and enables leaders to minister to people who are suffering. We pray that God brings

redemption, hope, and renewed unity out of this time of suffering. We pray often for your church, that God's love and power would shine through you as you seek to minister to hurting people in your community and the world. We are grateful for you and always appreciate hearing from you.

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From the Racial Justice Committee

We are living in a time where there doesn't seem like there's a lot to celebrate. Our convictions, our divisions, and our "tribalisms" seem to keep us focused on the bad. We spend a lot of time talking about "our" rights and what "they" should be doing and how the world is falling apart around us. We would be wise to focus on "what is" rather than on "what is wrong."

In his letter to the Colossians Paul reminds them of who they are and calls them to live that out. The church in Colossae was flourishing until false teachers disrupted their growth and confused their theology. This letter was written to help the Colossians "refocus." We live in a world much like that of the Colossian Christians. There's a lot of mixing of views and many self-proclaimed "saviors." Such "saviors" create fears in us about our brothers and sisters and fan the flames of those fears to lead us astray. They want us to believe that Jesus is fine, but we need more to guide our lives. When we find ourselves in a place or with a group that sees Jesus as "important" but not central, we're in the wrong place.

Before ascending into heaven Jesus said to the disciples: "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." Matthew 28:19. Since God is for all nations, would Jesus really support the belief that immigrants are the root of our nation's problems and should be excluded? Would Jesus endorse the idea that one group of people is superior to the other? I don't think Jesus would.

Paul, inspired by the Holy Spirit, wrote this letter to the Colossian Christians to let them know, and to let every generation and culture since the first century, know, that Jesus Christ is Lord. Let us love one another out of Christ's love for us all. Let us seek to remove fear and hatred of differences we find among ourselves, and embrace each other in the true spirit of Jesus Christ.

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2023 Peacemaking Travel Study Seminars

Cathy Chang, our PC(USA) Mission Co-worker in the Philippines, will be leading a peacemaking travel study seminar February 3-17, 2023. The seminar, called *Philippines and Hong Kong: Root Causes and Current Challenges of Forced Migration and Labor Trafficking*, will include community visits where participants will meet leaders of migrant-serving organizations and hear the testimonies of migrant workers and their families. Special attention will focus on how faith-based communities are assisting in the struggle for justice and human rights. Applications are due by November 5, 2022.
