From Rev. Dr. Troy Hauser Brydon

I have always loved how the Apostle Paul used the human body as a way of describing the church. In 1 Corinthians 12 he writes, “For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ.” He goes on to write about a body not functioning fully. The foot gets jealous of the hand and decides to opt out of the body. The ear does the same to the eye. If the whole body were feet, would it be a body? Or if it were made up solely of ears, how could it see?

As I look out on the worshipping congregation on Sundays, there are times that I wonder where the body is. I suspect one of the great sadnesses I will have in my entire career as a pastor will be what Covid did to the gathered body of Christ. I see spaces in pews where perhaps you or your friends sat. Where once you would have attended worship on most weeks, now you might go weeks in between coming. It’s been beautiful welcoming new members to the church, but it’s been sad to miss the familiar faces.

Let me stress this to the whole church: it will be a struggle to be fully the kind of church we’d like to be until we begin finding our ways back into worship with more regularity.

Worship serves many purposes. Foremost is that it is our joy to sing, pray, and speak the good news of Jesus together. But worship also is the means by which the Holy Spirit draws us together as a community. There may be weeks that you don’t feel like worshipping, but perhaps the reason you would make your ways to the pews on those weeks is to be present to your family of faith. We need each other. The bonds that are formed in worship simply cannot be replicated online—no matter how well we do it.

So, my dear friends, let us find our way back to church. Let us encourage each other to do so. Let us make plans to dig in to life together once again. Let us be the beautiful body of Christ we can be.

The end of February does bring the beginning of Lent. Mark your calendars for the return of our Shrove Tuesday Pancake Dinner—now with a game night!—on February 21 and for beginning Lent in Worship on Ash Wednesday (February 22). See you soon—at church!

From Rev. Kristine Aragon Bruce

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Dear Church Family,

As I write this we are two weeks into our sermon series on Revelation. When Troy shared at our community Pastors' Prayer group this week that our current sermon series is on Revelation they looked at him like he was one of the six-winged creatures in Revelation chapter 4. Revelation is a book we tend to avoid or at the best overlook. Much less commit a sermon series to it.

When I was a chaplain intern at a mental hospital in New Jersey, my supervisor told all of us interns that if we wanted to do a Bible study it could be on any book of the Bible except Revelation. This is because many of the patients were diagnosed with schizophrenia and the imagery in Revelation could exacerbate hallucinations. I'd add that anyone,

not just those who struggle with mental illness, would find the imagery in Revelation troubling.

I'm excited about our sermon series on Revelation since it's a chance to reclaim a book that has been grossly misinterpreted throughout history. To quote Pastor Troy, "Revelation is a great book about worship." As with all scripture, it's also a beautiful picture of God's grace as well. In order to see this, however, one has to read about the crazy monsters John, the author, describes before understanding what Revelation has to say about God's grace. In addition, Revelation is considered apocalyptic literature, a genre of literature that we are not well acquainted with. It is full of allegory and wild imagery that is not meant to be taken literally. The original audience, the seven churches of Asia, knew not to take John's imagery literally.

That being said, I'd love to dig deeper into Revelation with you. I am leading an hour-long Bible study on Revelation on Mondays from 11:30-12:30. We will work through the book "Breaking the Code" by Dr. Bruce Metzger, a former Princeton Seminary professor and who also led the team of scholars who translated the New Revised Standard translation (NRSV) of the Bible, which is the translation we have in our pews. I encourage you to join this group as all scripture was meant to be read in community. Feel free to contact me if you're interested or have any questions:)

Senior Pastor Sabbatical Planning

This month marks six years of ministry among us for our Senior Pastor, the Rev. Dr. Troy Hauser Brydon. When the church called Pastor Troy in 2017, we agreed to follow the presbytery's sabbatical policy, which means 2024 will be the time when the church will give Pastor Troy a sabbatical.

Beyond the policy, a sabbatical is a necessary time for reflection and reimagining of our shared ministry. It is a chance for both the church and the pastor to seek and strengthen God's calling. The Session is working with Pastor Troy to map out what this time looks like, and we're making plans for how this is a renewing time for the church and for the pastor.

There are sobering statistics about pastoral burnout. Ninety percent of pastors feel fatigued and worn out on a weekly basis. Seventy percent of pastors say they have lower self-esteem now than when they entered ministry. Eighty percent believe ministry has negatively affected their families.

Our goal is to ensure that we can nurture our pastors so they are in the place spiritually and emotionally to nurture us in mind, body, and spirit.

More information on this sabbatical period will be coming in the near future. The Session is eager to make this a spiritually enriching time for the whole church.

From the Mission Committee Hand to Hand Ministries

The Hand2Hand Program provides extra food support for the weekends and school holidays for local school-aged children, and has been a ministry of our church for more than 15 years. It is largely funded by donations from individual church members as well as from the Mission Committee, Presbyterian Women and some community organizations. Our program is currently serving 61 students at Mary A. White Elementary and 12 at Lakeshore Middle School. Every week, thirty-one volunteers plan, order, pick up, pack and deliver 10-12 nutritious food items per student each week. Food items include a variety of breakfast, lunch/dinner, and snack options.



Due to a number of factors such as increasing food costs and increasing number of students needing food support, the Hand2Hand fund is in need of additional financial support. If you would like to donate, you can write a check to First Presbyterian Church and designate the Hand2Hand fund on the memo line. We thank you all for the support that you have given or will give to this important ministry of the church.

From the Earth Care Committee Talking Climate with Katharine Hayhoe

Katharine Anne Scott Hayhoe is a Canadian atmospheric scientist. In 2021, Hayhoe joined the Nature Conservancy as Chief Scientist.



Good News

Climate change is affecting food security worldwide. One solution is to grow food closer to where people live. This is already happening in cities like Montreal and Dallas, Texas.

In Montreal, Lufa Farms has built four rooftop greenhouses that supply over 20,000 families every week. They estimate they could feed the entire city if they converted the rooftops of 19 shopping centers into hydroponic greenhouses! And in Texas, an elementary school teacher named Michael Bell grows organic produce on his half-acre plot in the south part of the city that nets him an additional \$120,000 a year.

Not-So-Good-News

Climate summaries for 2022 were released this week, and it's exactly what scientists expected: not good. Last year was a La Niña year, which should mean cooler temperatures, but it was the 5th warmest year on record, and the last 8 years have been the warmest recorded globally.

In 2022 there were 18 billion-plus dollar weather and climate events in the US. That's more than one every three weeks; and it doesn't count the devastating floods in California as climate change supersedes the atmospheric rivers dumping massive amounts of rain on the state.

What You Can Do

Each year, Katharine adopts two new climate-friendly habits. Last year, she swapped out her dishwasher and laundry detergent for plastic-free, plant-based products. She also started a newsletter and a Tik-Tok account (because talking about climate is the most important thing we can do!). This year, she moved; so she sold her solar panels to the new homeowners and signed up for a 100% green power plan instead. There's probably one where you live. In Texas, wind and solar save a lot of money: \$20 million a day, across the state! Katharine is going to buy a fully electric car replacement this year.

What are your New Year's resolutions? How can they help you live out your values and start conversations about climate with people in your life?

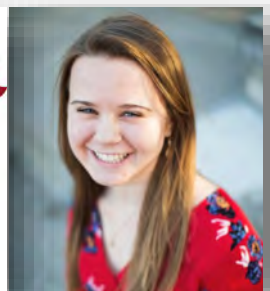
2022/23 Season
