

From Rev. Dr. Troy Hauser Brydon

I tend to be a level-headed, clear-thinking person. I am not really a feeler, but I have to admit that the church is all of a sudden feeling like we're back. I can even name when that feeling started - Wednesday, March 22nd. That evening the chapel filled with worshippers looking for the peace at the Taizé service. The lounge filled with more folks sharing a soup dinner. Then the chapel filled again with YogaFaith. At the same time the Carillon Ringers were rehearsing downstairs, and the Cub Scout Pack was hanging out in Fellowship Hall. The evening was capped with the Geneva Choir rehearsing in the sanctuary. What a joy it is to see the building humming again and the parking lot full.

Now that we've wrapped our series on Revelation, our attention goes straight to Holy Week. This Sunday brings Palm Sunday, where we follow Jesus entering Jerusalem in a strange kind of triumph. On Monday through Wednesday, you could follow the steps of Jesus through reading these texts: Monday — Jesus clears the Temple (Matthew 21:12-22); Tuesday -Jesus goes to the Mount of Olives (Matthew 21:23-24:51); and Wednesday - Holy Wednesday (John 11). (Note that the Bible doesn't record what Jesus did on Wednesday, so after a couple of tiring days, perhaps he rested before the turmoil of his final days.)

On Maundy Thursday (April 6) we'll gather for worship at 7:00 p.m. in the sanctuary. That service will include hand washing and communion. The service ends with the stripping of the sanctuary, a sad cliffhanger that sets the scene for the next service. At noon on Good Friday, we'll gather again in the sanctuary. It's a sad service. It reminds me a lot of a funeral. With Jesus in the tomb on Saturday, we rest and reflect on how empty life is apart from Jesus. In a world willing to kill Jesus, we need a Savior!

But, then, it's Easter Sunday! Christ is risen, and nothing will ever be the same! We have three services on Easter. 7:00 a.m. is our sunrise service, where we flower the cross. 9:00 is our traditional service with lots of brass. 11:00 is our Gathering service. After three straight disrupted Easters, I am hopeful that this year will be wonderful and filled with our congregation and visitors. So, come! And bring others with you. Let's celebrate the resurrection together.



Of course, we know that church is more than Easter. We'll be here every Sunday, so keep coming. Two weeks after Easter, we'll highlight our congregation's Earth Care efforts and focus on how God calls us to take care of the creation. (Speaking of that, have you noticed the improved, LED lighting throughout the building?) May brings many other celebrations - communion, Mother's Day, Graduation Sunday, and Pentecost.

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Dear Church Family,

I thought about writing about Easter, but I wanted to instead focus on Holy Week. If you are like me and didn't grow up in the church or you grew up in a church that was not highly liturgical you most likely aren't familiar with the church calendar, Lent or Holy Week. For various reasons, many churches have put aside these traditions.

Holy Week is the last week in the season of Lent. Just as Advent prepares us for the coming of Jesus, Lent is a season of preparing ourselves for how Jesus' resurrection changed everything.

Palm Sunday is the Sunday before Easter when we remember Jesus' triumphant arrival in Jerusalem and that he is one step closer to the cross.

Maundy Thursday is the Thursday before Holy Week when we

remember Christ's command to love and serve others in the same way he did. It's also the day we remember Jesus's command to participate in Communion, where we are spiritually nourished and empowered by the spiritual presence of Jesus' body and blood. Maundy is the Latin word for "mandate," or command.

Good Friday is the day we remember Jesus' death on the cross. It's akin to having a funeral service for Jesus, but also knowing he will be raised back to life. If you're like me and you'd rather jump to the happy "ending" of Jesus' resurrection I'd encourage you to spend time in Good Friday. Focusing on Jesus' suffering is hard, but it also reminds us of just how deep and powerful God's love is for us and the world. Good Friday invites us to spend time in Christ's death so that we will know more fully on Easter Sunday that death never has the final say.

So if you're on the fence about attending any of the Holy Week services, I'd encourage you to jump off and commit to attending the **Maundy Thursday service on April 6th at 7 pm and our Good Friday Service on April 8th at noon.** Both will be in the sanctuary.

As always, if you know of someone who would like to learn more about Holy Week, invite them along with you to these services. Looking forward to rejoicing in Jesus' resurrection with you!




The Deacons of FPGH
