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Dear Church Family,

As many of you know I am on the steering committee of the Unifying Pastors Coalition. On August 17th, I and two other steering committee members, Fr. Jared Cramer from St. John's Episcopal, Grand Haven, and Rev. Gordon Wiersma from Hope Church RCA in Holland, will serve on a panel about "Faith and Politics." Our hope is to offer a Christian perspective of our community that differs from what has been represented by some elected officials.

First of all, I want to say that I am not officially representing First Pres on this panel although I realize I unofficially represent First Pres wherever I am. The goal of this panel is to encourage all of us to think more deeply about how our faith in Jesus Christ influences how we love our neighbors, even when we may disagree. As Michael Wear, author, speaker, and political strategist in the intersection of faith and politics, said: "Politics is a forum for loving your neighbor." He is quoted as identifying three ways our Christian hope "points the way to political hope:"

- 1. Commitment active involvement in pursuing the authentic good of our communities rather than withdrawing into selfish isolation.
- 2. Justice a firm conviction, expressed in action, that doing right is better than doing well.
- 3. Humility overcoming the domineering passions of the culture wars and seeking to be of real use to others rather than to be in charge of others.

I appreciate Wear's words and insights. We tend to not get involved in politics because politics, for most of us, has left a bad taste in our mouths. While I am a proponent of the separation of church and state, I'm also an opponent of anyone who uses the name of Jesus Christ and scripture to justify discrimination.

I've also felt convicted by Wear's third point: humility. Those with whom I disagree are still loved by God and made in God's image. We may disagree theologically as well as politically, but that does not change the fact that we are all equally loved in the eyes of Jesus. I'm prayerfully discerning how I can actually live this out rather than just talk about it. I hope the forum on August 17th will be a start. I also hope you can attend and as always, invite your friends and neighbors! It will be at 6 p.m. on August 17, in the Mackinaw Ballroom of Central Park Place in Grand Haven. Hope to see you there!

Project Ripple Effect 2023

Project Ripple Effect is back after a 4-year hiatus, and we need your help in identifying worthy organizations that may need just that little bit of extra financial help. In 2019, your FPGH mission committee distributed one-time-only distributions for 12 out of the 21 organization requests and ranged from \$250 to \$1,000. The total distribution was \$5,000.

Some examples from the 2019 requests included funding for tutors, scholarships, funds to build handicap carts, and funds for a clothing closet, just to name a few. This year we want to do even more and have committed up to \$10,000 to worthy causes that you help identify.

The committee will be accepting Project Ripple Effect 2.0 application

forms until September 12, at which point all the projects will be reviewed by various members of the mission committee. While not all projects may be funded, the amount of available funds has grown. Completed forms should be returned to the office as early as possible. Requests of up to \$1,000 are being considered. Please help us to help others.

Presbyterian Coffee, Fair Trade, and Equal Exchange

Our congregation has been serving coffee from the Presbyterian Coffee Project for several months now. The PCP partners with Equal Exchange as its supplier of coffee, and our church buys directly from them. You can also buy direct from Equal Exchange at shop.equalexchange.coop for use in your home or business.

Equal Exchange was founded in the 1980s and began by importing coffee from small cooperatives in Nicaragua. But in 2010 Equal Exchange declared that "Fair Trade is dead." Why would the PC(USA) partner with such an organization, and why should you buy from them?

Equal Exchange maintains that slowly, over time, certification bodies began to gain control of the fair trade "movement." All the deep complexities, engagement, and debate around ethics and democracy that were em-

bedded in fair trade were reduced to the crop, helping them a dumbed-down, but very clever marketing slogan on the part of the certifiers: Just "look for the [fair trade] seal." And so fair trade was co-opted by corporations eager to hop on the wagon and claim a shiny, but hollow, version as their own. Fair trade standards were watered down to allow inclusion of large plantations and commercial operations that are "easier to work with" and are far removed from the original fair trade ideal.

Equal Exchange instead works only with individual farmers and small cooperatives, is itself organized as a cooperative, and sees itself as establishing connections between suppliers and consumers of the foods they source, rather than as a business supplying fair trade foodstuffs. They share the bounty of the coffee trade with those who grow

build a better future for themselves and their communities. Through these relationships, farmers earn a fairer share of income, and can become independent of the large scale, profit-motivated large organizations that dominate the global food chain.

Cooperatives often use profits to establish community development programs such as schools, health clinics and training in areas such as leadership development. Thus the whole process becomes more relational than transactional, to echo our God's concern that we do justice and love mercy.

So won't you consider Equal Exchange as your partner in helping these small farmers and organizations?

QPR is typically offered at no cost to businesses, churches, schools, and other community groups. Several other mental health topics are available as well. Mosaic's school outreach program wrapped up for the year, but a lot of activity is already underway for the coming school year as therapists are oriented to the program and placed in schools.


