the beginning of November, I am leading a team of 16 people in mission to Orange Walk, Belize. I have been partnered with Koinonia Ministries for the past decade, and this will be my fifth trip there — my first in four years. This trip is also the third time FPGH has sent a team to Belize, with a fourth trip planned next summer for our youth.

We have several projects on our agenda. First, we are bringing loads of tutoring materials with us. Our team will help train Koinonia's members with tutoring elementary students in math and reading. This plays into the gifts of our team and helps Koinonia in its consistent work with the children and youth of their community. Second, we'll be assisting with some painting and maintenance around their church facility. Third, we'll be working with the children's and youth groups, as we share faith and life together. The centerpiece of these trips is always on building relationships, and we'll have time to do that over meals, riding in the bumpy van to work sites, and serving together.

Pastor Ed Perez has asked me to preach in their Sunday service, which is a tremendous honor. If you want to see your pastor preach in Belize (with Spanish translation!), you can find Koinonia Ministries on Facebook. Search for Koinonia Orange Walk Belize, and I'm sure you'll find them.

I ask that you keep this mission team in your prayers. We'll be there from November 2-8, and these trips are always eye-opening and faith-deepening for their participants. We all come back with new perspectives and deepened faith.

The first Sunday of November is when we mark All Saints. We remember all connected to our congregation who have died over the past year. In a typical year, this roster is 12-15 people, but this year has been a hard one. We will remember over 25 saints who are no longer with us on this side of glory. So, I ask that you pray for those who are still grieving loved ones. I hope you'll be in worship to give thanks with us for all the saints.

Finally, November is a time when we take the posture of gratitude. It culminates with Thanksgiving, a special time with loved ones for sure. What are you grateful for right now? How can you express your gratitude to another? As our annual Generosity Campaign wraps up, I want to express my thanksgiving for you. This congregation is special. You love well. You care well. You are generous. It's a joy and privilege to be a pastor to you.

Thank you for your prayers and your generous spirits.

Dear Church Family,

In her book *Grateful*, Diana Butler Bass writes "multiple studies demonstrate connections between well-being (life satisfaction and happiness), physical health, and gratitude. In heart patients who are asymptomatic, researchers found that people who were grateful slept better, were less depressed and tired, and were more self-aware and confident, with lower risks of inflammation. According to one study, gratitude is a dimension of 'spirituality and/ or religious wellness'; it suggests that gratitude interventions might lower the risk of heart disease. 'It seems that a more grateful heart,' says researcher Paul Mills, 'is indeed a more healthy heart.'"

During this Thanksgiving season, I'm also reminded how gratitude not just affects our health, but also deepens our relationship with Jesus Christ. How we live does not earn us God's love as God has already demonstrated God's love for us in what Jesus did for us on the cross. Jesus's death and resurrection made God's love for us a done deal.

How we *respond* to what Jesus did for us, however, reflects the impact Jesus's sacrifice has made on our lives. When we respond in gratitude to God for Jesus's actions on the cross it shows our willingness to be transformed by God's grace. There are many ways we can respond in gratitude to God. We can thank God in our prayers. Psalm 100 is a great example of a prayer of thanksgiving. We can also respond in gratitude to God by how we show our gratitude for one another. Paul always gave thanks in his letters to those whom God put in his life to encourage and support him.

This Thanksgiving season I hope we are more intentional about giving thanks to God for his love and faithfulness through Jesus Christ. As it states in James 1:17: "Every generous act of giving, with every perfect gift, is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change." I encourage you to share with God your gratitude for the many ways you've experienced the love of Christ in your life this Thanksgiving season.

In Our Church

First Pres Composting 101

The Earth Care Team has recently begun composting the waste generated at First Presbyterian Church. Members of the team bring our compost waste to the Ottawa County Sustainability Center (on Comstock) for composting. The county sends the waste collected there to an industrial site in Grand Rapids, where waste materials collected reach a minimum internal temp of 220 degrees! Because of that high temperature, more things can be composted—including bones, chicken skin, fats (like butter and oil), soiled cardboard and paper, plus the usual foods, fruits and veggies we are familiar with!

Here is a quick guide of what can be tossed into our compost containers:

YES

- Non-coated paper plates
- Soiled cardboard food containers: pizza boxes, many take-outs
- Utensils marked with a compost stamp, wood stir sticks
- Paper cups marked compostable
- Food: meat, bread, snacks, tea bags, fruit, veggies-if it's edible and leftover it's all good! Even old flowers!

NO

- Coated paper plates (shiny, waterproof, colored)
- Coated food boxes or packages
- Dirty plain napkins and paper towels Napkins with color or decorations
 - Plastic utensils
 - Most paper cups (they have a thin plastic coating!) - usually "party cups," Biggby, & Starbucks, etc.

This is a learning process, so we have posted signs above the trash and compost bins to help. If you still aren't sure where to throw your trash items, it is better to throw them in the regular trash can.

The Earth Care Team purchases special bags for the compost waste, and when the bags are full, they are taken back to the Sustainability Center by an ECT member. It makes their job much easier when they don't have to pick out the noncompostable items from the bags!



Each person can make a difference in earth care! Thank you for trying each day!

Are you 70 1/2 or older with an **Individual Retirement Account?**

Are you aware of the potential tax benefits of donating to FPGH using a Qualified Charitable **Distribution (QCD)?**

A QCD is a direct transfer from your IRA to a qualified charity like First Presbyterian Church. QCDs are popular ways of giving because of the possible tax benefits:

- The donation is not included in the donor's adjusted gross income, helping to avoid higher Medicare premiums, increased taxes on Social Security income. and the loss of deductions
- QCDs don't require that you itemize, so donors who use the standard deduction may receive a tax benefit.
