

From Rev. Dr. Troy Hauser Brydon

Happy New Year! I was just telling other staff this week that I've been writing 2024 on many of my sermons for the past few months, so I must be ready to turn the calendar to another. The simple turning of the calendar offers us the opportunity for resets and new beginnings. In whatever way you are feeling God's calling to be and do differently this year, I hope that you follow through on that. I also hope that you know your pastors and friends at the church can be a part of these positive changes in your life.

February marks seven years of ministry for me at FPGH. That doesn't feel possible, but it's true. Life expectancy in the U. S. is now 77 years, so I have devoted almost 10% of my life to the church already. I have been a pastor for almost 17 years, and because I have transitioned before making it seven years at one church, I have never had a sabbatical. That will change this summer, and I am beyond grateful for that.

The session approved a sabbatical plan for me and the church that begins around Memorial Day and ends around Labor Day this summer. There will be many more details to come on this, but I wanted to offer you the broad strokes at this point. The sabbatical is a period of rest and renewal for me and my family. It gives us a chance to breathe a bit and celebrate what God has done in our ministry. During next summer, we will not be at FPGH, although for parts of the summer we'll be in Grand Haven. We intend to do some traveling to reconnect and have some meaningful experiences together.

The ministry of the church will not hit "pause" while I'm away. In fact, this is a time for renewal for the congregation. There will be an opportunity to read a book on sabbath for the congregation. It's one I plan to read while away. This is also a time for the congregation to redouble its efforts at owning the ministry of the church. (If ministry stops while I'm gone, then I've failed you! In Presbyterian churches, the ministers are the members.) Pastor Kristine and the session have plans in place to ensure that worship, pastoral care, and all the ministry will carry on while I'm on sabbatical.

If you've ever owned rechargeable batteries, you know that, over time, they hold less and less capacity for a charge. There are days when I feel like I'm becoming an old rechargeable battery. The energy and imagination I have for ministry isn't what it used to be. I am so thrilled to have this opportunity for sabbatical because I know it can launch us together into a new, energized season of ministry. I'm ready for it, and I know the church is too.

More will be forthcoming, but on behalf of my family, thank you for this opportunity. It's a blessing.

Dear Church Family,

Happy New Year! Now is the time when many of us make New Year's resolutions. Gyms will be more full. More vegetables and fruits will be sold in grocery stores. Many will engage in what is known as "Dry January." Most of us will be fortunate enough to keep our resolutions until the end of February, but to be honest I could never keep mine so I stopped making them! At the same time, however, I like having some kind of a goal or something I'm working toward. Not making resolutions has made it easier for me to continue toward a goal when I've taken a detour. I suppose I've still made a New Year's resolution, I just don't call it that.

Whether or not you make a New Year's resolution, I pray you have grace for yourself when you find yourself doing or not doing something you had set out to do. None of us are perfect and God knows this about us better than anyone else.

Consider making it a goal and/or

New Year's resolution to be more intentional about devotionally studying the Bible. What I mean by that is to read God's word to listen for how Jesus is working in your life. In other words, how can what vou've read in God's word apply to your daily life? I've been following a great devotion by Sky Jethani called "With God Daily: Devotionals for people who hate devotions." The title immediately caught me. You can find these devotions at www.withgoddaily.com. Jethani is a sought after speaker, author, and co-host of the Holy Post Podcast. I highly recommend it! It's a devotion free of Christian cliches and is theologically sound. It's a devotion that has reminded me of Jesus's love for me and others, but also pushes me to think more deeply and critically about what it means to be a follower of Jesus Christ.

In a recent devotion, Jethani writes about Rahab the Gentile prostitute who is included in Jesus's genealogy. She was the one who hid Joshua and the other Israelite spies as they

entered Jericho. She did this because she had heard about God's great deeds to protect the Israelites and how God freed them from slavery in Egypt. We tend to focus on Rahab's profession, but the real focus should be on her faith. Jethani writes: "The dramatic part of Rahab's story isn't her vocation, it's her confession. From the mouth of this non-Israelite woman comes one of the most articulate professions of faith recorded anywhere in the Old Testament, and it stands in stark contrast with the Israelites themselves." He goes on to write: "She (Rahab) reminds us that ultimately it is our allegiance to God, not our labels, that matters most," These devotions are short yet powerful. And if you miss a day don't despair! Each day is a new day to spend

Missions Supported by Your Giving Step Up: Housing Young Adults, Empowering Change, Transforming Lives

Step Up, founded in 2016 in Muskegon, partners with other local



nonprofits to create a wraparound care approach for young women aged 18-24 who have aged out of foster care and are seeking a successful transition to adulthood.

Housing, mentoring, educational guidance, and life skills training are provided for these young people within a Christian environment. Participants live in community by sharing a common kitchen, dining, and living area while maintaining privacy in their own bedroom. A house manager lives on site to keep the house running smoothly, and the young people meet with a support network of volunteers and community partners. A maternity house is also open for young pregnant women and their infants up to the age of nine months. Recently, Step Up purchased another Muskegon house which will be for young men, hopefully to open in 2024. Participants in the Step Up program meet weekly with a program coordinator to accomplish goals that include education, budgeting, relationships, and a transition plan. Currently, all of the young women are employed and one is taking college classes while another is taking driver's training.

First Presbyterian is partnering with Step Up to share Christ's love with these young adults.

"How to Read the Bible: The Old Testament" with Dr. Matthew Aragon Bruce

Many of us have started more than one New Year with the resolution to read the Bible more (or maybe even *start* reading it!) And many of us, when we open to the Old Testament, have struggled with the dense lists of geologies, commands, and prophecies, let alone all the foreign sounding names, strange traditions, and complicated history. And so, not a few of us have found that by the end of January we've failed at this resolution.

Yet the Old Testament, with its seemingly strange customs, traditions, laws, and history, is the basis of the New Testament church's faith in Jesus Christ. Come join us as we learn how to better read the Old Testament and discover that the Triune God has given it to us to encourage and deepen our faith in Jesus.


the climate crisis and is Vice President of the Evangelical Environmental Network.

Nantucket Spider donated some single-use packets of laundry detergent sheets. Kids can use the books at the laundromat, take them home to keep, or bring them back and forth. Joyful Noise employees are checking back monthly to tidy the rack and re-stock books and laundry sheets.

With remaining funds, Joyful Noise hopes to expand this program to other local laundromats in the new year!


