

## From Rev. Dr. Troy Hauser Brydon

Lent begins early this year, which means Easter is also on the early side in 2024. What is Lent? It's the season of preparation that leads to Easter. During that time, Christians engage in acts of repentance and often commit to a season of deepening a spiritual discipline (prayer, study, fasting, etc.). The season lasts for forty days, a period of time that does not includes Sundays, since every Sunday is meant to be a mini-Easter — a reminder that Christ has conquered the grave in the midst of our journeying with him towards the cross.

So, consider this your invitation to engage deeply with us this Lent. The day before Lent starts, we throw a party. The Hospitality Committee is arranging for a Shrove Tuesday pancake dinner in Fellowship Hall on February 13. The food and the camaraderie is always great! The following day is Ash Wednesday. We'll have a special worship service in the sanctuary at 7 p.m. that includes the imposition of ashes.

On Wednesdays in Lent, we're continuing to hold our Taizé services in the chapel. Those services are at 6:00 p.m. and will be followed by a simple soup supper. I love how these services fill the chapel with prayer and song. I know they are an integral part of my Lenten preparation.

On Sundays throughout Lent, our focus will be on the beatitudes, which are found in Matthew 5:1-12. We'll cover one beatitude each week for most weeks, which means really dwelling in these brief sentences. To help the congregation dwell in each beatitude, we're planning to take time in worship to write collect prayers (pronounced CALL-ect, not coll-ECT). These prayers gather (or really collect) words around a particular theme, in our case a beatitude.

So, come to worship expecting to engage in this activity where we each write our own brief collects based upon the beatitude for the week. We plan to display these prayers (they'll be anonymous) as an art project and to share some of the prayers over social media and in worship.

Why do this? First, we hope it really helps everyone find a way to engage with the Bible more deeply. It will take a little getting used to, but I'm confident that you'll come to like it. Second, this activity will help teach us a new, simple way of praying. I know not everyone is confident in prayer, so this is a chance to help us practice this together.

I'm excited that Lent is almost here. I hope you are too. I look forward to growing with you this Lent.

# From Rev. Kristine Aragon Bruce

Dear Church Family,

Easter is early this year! Lent begins on February 14<sup>th</sup> (yep, we are having a contemplative and somber service on the day that celebrates love. (More on that later).

You may have grown up in a tradition that did not observe Lent. Lent comes from the Old English word *lencten* which means "Spring Season," which is also the meaning of the Dutch word *lente*. Christians have observed Lent for centuries and it's meant to be a time of remembering and observing why Jesus chose to give his life for all. It's meant to be a somber time when we reflect on our brokenness and our sin, but it's also meant to end in celebration of Christ's resurrection on Easter morning.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, which this year falls on Valentine's day. A somber Ash Wednesday service would not be a good idea for those who want to experience a romantic evening (especially a first date), but it is still a time to observe love, specifically the love God has for us. God created us out of love, and out of love God desires to be in a relationship with us and desires us to be whole. We see the love of God most clearly in what Jesus said and did culminating in Jesus' sacrifice on the cross. As Jesus told the disciples in John 15:13: *"No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends."* 

I'd encourage you this Lenten season to find ways to reflect on the love God has for us and what that has to do with Christ's death and resurrection. One way to do this is to pray using scripture. We will have opportunities to write prayers together in worship during our next sermon series on the Beatitudes (Matthew chapter 5). This may be awkward for some at first, but the hope is that you will feel more comfortable writing prayers in your own words. I also promise your prayers won't be graded:) God doesn't expect our prayers to be Shakespeare, but God does desire them to be honest and sincere, even if it means being honest about our disappointment with or doubts about God. God can handle it. God just wants to hear from us because that's what it means to have communion (a.k.a. to be in a relationship with God. Jesus desires to know what it is we are really thinking and feeling. When we are honest with Jesus we will have a better understanding of God's love that resulted in Jesus going to the cross for us. My prayer this Lenten season is that we would develop a more real and authentic faith by sharing with Christ our real and authentic selves.

The Hand2Hand Program provides extra food support for the weekends and school holidays for local school-aged children, and has been a ministry of our church for

a ministry of our church for more than 15 years. It is largely funded by donations from individual church members as well as from the Mission Committee, Presbyterian Women and some community organizations.

Every week, volunteers plan, order, pick up, pack and deliver 10-12 nutritious food items per student each week. Food items include a variety of breakfast, lunch/dinner, and snack options.





### From the Earth Care Team Help Us Preserve God's Magnificent Earth!

The PC(USA) has been encouraging all Presbyterian churches to become Earth Care congregations for over ten years. The Earth Care Team has been educating our congregation on the importance of recycling since FPGH became an Earth Care congregation five years ago.

Committee member Bob Day arranged an expansion of our recycling program with Republic Services, without an increase in cost. Our church now has a complete pick-up of all types of recycling items. All areas of our church are participating in recycling, including Joyful Noise, which has been active in recycling for many years.

The Earth Care Committee has provided recycling/compost/trash containers to use in Fellowship Hall which allows people to divide up their waste and put it in the appropriate bins. Our most recent recycling effort involves a threecompartment Rubbermaid recycle container for the lounge. One compartment collects all items to be recycled and picked up by Republic, one compartment collects things that cannot be recycled and will go to a landfill, and the last compartment is for composting.


