Easter 2024 has come and gone, and I hope all of you, in your own way, experienced the hope and joy of what the resurrection means. I truly love the rhythms of Lent, Holy Week, and Easter at our church. As a ministry professional, it can be difficult to engage as a worshipper because I'm often thinking about what's next, where I'm supposed to stand, and what I should say. At this time of year, it all settles into place. Thanks for being a church where you pastor can worship!

It's been over seven years since I arrived in Grand Haven. The time has flown! This church has such a big heart. Your ministry is steadfast. Your care for the Tri-Cities and beyond is clear. While much has changed over the past seven years, the heart of First Presbyterian keeps beating steadfastly. You, the members, make up a great church. I hope you know that, and I hope you embrace that who *you* are makes our ministry.


It is with gratitude that my attention now turns towards a sabbatical. For over a year the session has been working with me on what this looks like. They approved the plan earlier this year, and now we're getting ready to enact those plans. I've been in ministry as a Presbyterian pastor since 2007. Preceding that I was in seminary for three years, and before that I was a campus minister for a year. So, I've been engaged in ministry since 2003. After 21 years, this is the first time I am taking a sabbatical to rest and renew. I am ready for it. I am excited for a new rhythm for these months. I am eager to hear how the church has engaged in ministry in new ways. I am already looking forward to starting a new chapter of ministry with you this fall.

My sabbatical will last from Memorial Day to Labor Day. During that time, my family and I will be spending more time with each other without the pressure of the next church activity. We'll be visiting family in Pennsylvania and Illinois. We'll be enjoying our home. For much of July we'll be exploring the United Kingdom, both because it's a place we want to share with our children and because I have deep family roots there. Sabbatical is about these new rhythms and experiences, but it is also about rest and renewal, so there will be lots of time built in for that.

Summer is a time for the church to be at rest and renewal. This sabbatical offers a similar reset for the whole church. Many of you will be stepping forward into ministry in this season to help the church flourish. I am encouraging a Big Read from the congregation this summer. Ruth Haley Barton wrote a book called *Embracing Rhythms of Work and Rest.* It's thirteen chapters long, about one chapter for each week I'll be gone. Each chapter offers the opportunity for the reader to reflect and journal on their own life. It's a

practice I'll be doing while gone, and it's one I hope you'll do individually, with a friend, or even with your family. it really is a book for all ages and stages of life. I imagine this will bear good fruit for you and for the church!

Session has plans in place for preaching, worship, and caregiving while I'm gone. We have several pastors in our pews who will be assisting Pastor

Dear Church Family,

A short devotion I read recently reminded me of the story of how God showed up for the Israelites, but of course in a way no one expected. After God frees the Israelites from slavery in Egypt the Israelites, as a result of their disobedience to God, find themselves wandering in the wilderness. While God could have completely abandoned them God remains with them and guides them through the desolate country.

At one point they find themselves attacked by poisonous snakes. After the Israelites cry out to God for help, God instructs Moses to make a snake out of bronze and lift it high on a pole. Not exactly the sign of hope and help the Israelites had asked for. However, when the Israelites looked at the bronze snake they were healed from their snake bites. What a weird story. But


the Bible is full of weird stories. The source of healing God provided was also a reference to their sin and disobedience. They would not have come into contact with poisonous snakes if they had not been in the wilderness. They would not have been in the wilderness if they had not whined to God about missing their life of slavery back in Egypt. I bet you can think of another strange symbol of God's mercy that also points to our sin. (Hint: We just celebrated this on March 31st). That's right...the cross is the ultimate symbol of God's love, mercy and forgiveness for us through Jesus Christ. Crucifixion was only used to execute the worst of criminals. Yet because Jesus was perfectly obedient to the point of accepting death on the cross, our disobedience is covered and forgiven through Christ's perfect obedience. My hope and prayer is

that while we are past Easter, we

would continue to be transformed by the power of Christ's death and resurrection.

How to Read the Bible God, the Bible, and Gender: Church Leaders and God-Talk

Beginning the Sunday after Easter, April 7, the How to Read the Bible group will, by popular request, begin discussing the interrelated themes of gender and 1) leadership in the church and 2) how we talk about God. Why for example do we have women pastors in the PC(USA) when the Bible has such statements as: "I do not permit a woman to teach or to have authority over a man; she is to keep silent" (1 Tim. 2.11)? Do we reject such verses or pretend they aren't there? Of course not! So how do we understand them as Presbyterians? Related to this is the question of how should we talk about God? The Bible often refers to God as "he," yet God does not have a body and therefore is neither male nor female, at least in the sense that we normally think of gender. Moreover, many people today struggle to refer to God as their "Father" or to think of God as male because of difficult experiences in the church, harmful relationships, and even abuse. How can we both stay faithful to the historic Christian faith and worship the God we love, while also speaking of God in ways that invite all people into a loving relationship with the God who loves us?
