year Lent came just about as early as it can in the year, but this year Lent has done the opposite. It's about the latest it can be in the year. (For those keeping score at home, you may want to know why Easter and Lent move around. It's what we call a "moveable feast," unlike Christmas, which has a fixed day. Easter happens on the first Sunday after the first full moon after the spring equinox. Clear as mud, right?)

Anyway, Easter is very late this year, which means Lent begins later. That means this month gives us space to carry on with other parts of our ministry. In worship, we'll continue in our Greatest Hits of the Bible series, tracing the stories of Rahab, Deborah, Gideon, Samson, and Ruth. We also have the wonderful opportunity to learn more about the thoughts and writings of C. S. Lewis on Wednesdays over lunch. He's one of the seminal Christian thinkers of the last century, so I hope you'll engage in this study.

It also gives us space to focus on something that is truly needed in our

church. The Generosity Committee has developed a Talent and Interest Survey that will be available online and in written form. (Since it's online, that means even our wonderful snowbirds can fill it out!) If you were at our Congregational Conversation, then you heard how this is a year where we are focusing on upping member engagement

with the ministry. In short, the church only works as well as its members are willing to step forward in ministry.

So, whether you get the survey in your inbox, through Facebook, or you take paper to pen at coffee hour, I urge you to find a new way or another way to be involved in your church. There are regular ways to serve on a Sunday morning — greeting, ushering, music, teaching, and welcoming. There are ways to help on a monthly basis like our committee work. There are ways that are sporadic.

God has a plan for you, and we have a place for you!

More often than not, it has been my experience that those who take a step forward in involvement usually find themselves happier with their experience in the church and more understanding of what it takes to be a church in this time. I hope you can take that step this winter and beyond.

## From Pastor Kristine Aragon

#### Dear Church Family,

For a myriad of reasons, we are living in anxious times. Our children and youth are also extremely anxious. It seemed fitting to explore a curriculum titled "Faith in an Anxious World" with our youth this winter. In this curriculum youth are encouraged to find a trusted family member or a trusted adult to talk about ways to manage their anxiety. It also gives youth leaders tips on when and how to connect youth who are struggling with counselors and therapists.

I thought I'd share the main themes we've been discussing as you may find it helpful. One of the main themes is to: "Look up. Look inside. Look around." Look up as in share with God in prayer what is causing you anxiety. To look inside means to reflect upon what our anxiety is telling us about ourselves and/or how Jesus is speaking to us amid our anxiety. To look around is to see which relationships Jesus has given us that can help us navigate our anxiety and invest in them. This past Sunday we discussed Luke 5:1-11. We talked about how Jesus gets in the boat with Simon Peter and stays in the boat when it becomes unsteady. When Simon in his anxiety starts to push Jesus away, Jesus reassures Simon and reconnects Simon to himself and to others. When Simon Peter and the other fisherman become overwhelmed with the amount of fish Jesus causes them to catch, he provides others to work alongside them to bring in their nets. The fact that Jesus finds others to work with Simon Peter, who is later commissioned by Jesus to be the rock of the church, shows that Jesus did not mean for us to go it alone. Especially when it comes to what God calls us to do. I hope and pray as a church we continue to find ways to serve others together and that we would help one another look up to the one who meets us in our anxiety.

### Project Ripple Effect Results

In December 2024-January 2025, the Mission Committee held our third annual "Project Ripple Effect" to nominate non-profit organizations for funding. This year, we were allocated \$15,000 for funding purposes by the session and awarded amounts of \$200-\$1500 per organization. After much deliberation, the Project Ripple Effect Committee chose the following beneficiaries to receive varying monies in support of their worthy organizations (in alphabetical order):

Thank you to everyone who filled out an application and congratulations to all of the organizations that received this exceptional funding. Thank you also to session, the Mission Committee and Project Ripple Effect Committee, for all of the time and careful consideration it took to make this happen. Extra special thanks to Sally Bryant, for her hard work and patience with this project. We are all hopeful that the Project Ripple Effect will continue in 2026!

### Pennies for a Purpose

Do you have extra pennies around your house that you would be willing to donate? A family in our



church is planning a home project that requires 78,000 pennies, and they have asked for your help. The dollar amount of pennies donated will be doubled by the family, with the funds supporting the Joyful Noise Scholarship Fund. For instance, if all 78,000 pennies are donated (\$780 worth), the family will donate \$1,560 to the Joyful Noise Scholarship Fund. Not only can you clear out your stash of pennies, but you'll also support families needing a little extra help with childcare tuition.

A large container will be available in the Gathering Area to collect your pennies starting the week of February 3rd. There will also be a poster board to track the progress of the total raised for the Scholarship Fund.

### From the Earth Care Team Who is to Care for the Earth?

Perhaps *how* to care for God's creation is debatable, but *who* is to care for God's creation isn't. As Christians, we aspire to righteousness, ("living in right relationship with God, other people, and all creation"), but how much attention do we pay to the right relationship with creation?

In Genesis we learn that God has given us "everything that has the breath of life" and "every green plant for food." The Lord then gave us the responsibility to "work and keep it." The word for keep in Hebrew, *shamar*, has been interpreted as "guard," "preserve," "to be faithful to," "maintain," and "exercise great care over."

The first step toward caring for creation might simply come from being AWE-STRUCK as we marvel at the beauty

of the landscape through which we hike or drive, amazed at the fruitfulness of the soil, inquisitive about the magic of the human body (strongly recommend you read *Fearfully and Wonderfully: The Marvel of Bearing God's Image* by Dr. Paul Brand and Philip Yancy), and thankful for photosynthesis that generates the air we breathe from the plants that surround us.

Yes, we need to pass some responsibility for care of creation to others. But several decades ago Lord Moulton, talking about morals and ethics, introduced the notion of "Obedience to the Unenforceable." Government through the mechanism of law creates the enforceable, but what about those things that are simply the right thing to do; those things that we find in both the old and new testaments of our Bible. Scripture asks us all to be part of the Earth Care Team.

### Explore the Writings of C.S. Lewis: A Lunchtime Discussion Series

The Faith Formation Committee invites you to embark on a fascinating exploration of the life and works of C.S. Lewis, one of the most influential Christian thinkers and authors of the 20th century. The five-week series will take place on Wednesdays at noon, from February 5th through March 5th, and will be led by Dr. Dale Sullivan, Emeritus Professor of English, North Dakota State University.

C.S. Lewis is best known for his significant contributions to Christian theology through works such as *Mere Christianity* and *The Screwtape Letters*. He also captured the imaginations of millions with his celebrated fantasy and science fiction, including the beloved *Chronicles of Narnia*. This discussion series will focus on Lewis's fantasy and science fiction writings, offering insights into their themes, significance, and enduring legacy.

#### **Class Schedule:**

- Week 1 (February 5): Introduction to the class, sharing past experiences with C.S. Lewis, a brief review of his life and writings, and an introduction to *Mere Christianity*. Discussion will follow.
- Week 2 (February 12): Introduction to *The Chronicles of Narnia*. Discussion.
- Week 3 (February 19): Introduction to C.S. Lewis's science fiction trilogy (*Out of the Silent Planet, Perelandra, That Hideous Strength*). Discussion.
- Week 4 (February 26): Introduction to *Till We Have Faces*. Discussion.
- Week 5 (March 5): Introduction to *The Great Divorce*. Class review.
