# From Pastor Kristine Aragon Bruce

Dear Church Family,

I've started seeing a spiritual director. If you're not familiar with spiritual directors, they are trained and certified to help people deepen their connection with God. They walk alongside those they guide, helping them discover ways to engage with God more meaningfully —wherever they are in life.

I've been feeling spiritually dry lately. It's been harder for me to engage in my usual spiritual disciplines—my ways of praying and devotionally reading scripture have become stale. While I am a part of a spiritual direction group once a month and am thankful for that group, I needed someone to help me explore, on a more personal level, how I might better spend time with God.

I shared with my spiritual director, Paula. how stale my usual practices had become, and I was grateful for her empathy. Paula shared with me a time in her life when she lacked motivation to pray and that her usual spiritual disciplines were no longer helpful. During that season, she found something simple but

meaningful: each morning, when she let her dog out in the back yard, she would take off her shoes and feel the grass beneath her feet and between her toes. At the same time she quietly prayed: "I am rooted in love." Later, at a meeting with her own spiritual director they commented that she seemed more "grounded." Paula replied: "Funny you should say that...."

Paula's prayer didn't explicitly mention Jesus, but she knew it was directed to him. Practically speaking, it also happened during a task she did daily. After my meeting with Paula, I felt free to simplify my own prayers—just one sentence, like hers—and to pair it with something I already do daily. I'm in a season where taking an hour, let alone a day, to journal or reflect feels nearly impossible. What I landed on was to pray "God is my refuge and my strength" as I do my daily stretching. As I stretch into a downward dog yoga pose and breathe in, I begin praying, "God is my refuge." Then as I exhale into cobra pose, I pray, "God is my strength." After a couple of weeks of doing this I am feeling more

connected to God again.

I tell you this because I know how busy this time of year can be. Often, the first thing that seems to go is intentional time with God. But incorporating a short prayer into something you already do—like walking the dog, gardening, commuting, or doing the dishes can make a meaningful difference. We don't have to rearrange our schedules to spend quality time in prayer with God. Jesus is everywhere and always with us so why not incorporate prayer into what you're already doing? It also doesn't have to be for very long. I stretch for about 10 minutes each day.

My encouragement for you this spring is to find a simple prayer—just a sentence or two—and quietly say it during something you already do. I'm confident that when we do this we'll be better able to see God's presence in our daily lives.

#### **Heart Words**

This Lent our congregation created an art project of our Heart Words. As we listened to the Psalms on Sunday and Isaiah on Wednesday, we wrote down a word that the Holy Spirit brought forward to each of us. These made their way to the artful hands of Maryanne Beery and Eric Snyder, who lovingly assembled them into the shape of a mandala in the Gathering Area. The installation will be up for the next few weeks, so take some time to prayerfully read the words we shared this Lent.





#### The Mandala

The mandala is a symbol of the universe in ideal form, and its creation signifies the transformation of a universe of suffering into one of joy. It can also be used as an aid to meditation, helping the meditator envision how to achieve the perfect self.


#### The word mandala means "circle"

The mandala pattern is used across most religious traditions. It represents wholeness, holiness, and all things encompassed by God.

In Christianity, there are many forms that are evocative of mandalas: the Celtic cross, the halo, the labyrinth, and rose windows are some examples. What a person does with a mandala is personal; it is a chance to slow down, to be quiet, and to call on God's creative energy.


Challenge yourself and your family to carpool, bike, or walk to nonchurch activities this summer as well, and develop a new habit of earth-friendly transportation!

We are the church together! On June 8, we celebrate the birthday of the church and so the **Pentecost Special Offering** connects us with the future of the church. It supports ministries with children, youth and young adults in our community, across the nation and around the world.

- 40% of the your gift will remain here with First Presbyterian Church to support the Hand2Hand Backpack Ministry, which provides bags of food for the weekend to local elementary and middle school children.
- 25% goes to the Young Adult Volunteer (YAV) experience which trains and equips young people ages 19-30 in mission at 13 sites in the U.S. and around the world.
- **25%** supports ministries with youth, ages 12-18. One example is the Youth Triennium held every three years at various locations with over 3,000 young people attending. In July this year, they will be in Louisville, KY.
- 10% supports the "Educate a Child Transform the World" PC(USA) initiative which works to improve education and provide safe havens for children-at-risk.

# From the Earth Care Committee: Small Steps Toward Better Stewardship!

First Presbyterian Church is proud to be one of only 14 Earth Care Congregations in Michigan, certified through the PC(USA) since 2019. This designation recognizes our ongoing commitment to care for God's creation through action in worship, education, facilities, and outreach.

In worship, we've incorporated Earth Care themes into services like Waterfront Worship. We refreshed the Memorial Garden with help from the Boy Scouts, creating a natural space for reflection. Educationally, we've hosted guest speakers, shared a video series on faith and climate, and provided resources in our library and *Tidings* newsletters.



Our facilities reflect our values: we've switched to LED lighting, added bike racks and a repair station, and developed strong recycling and composting programs. We also use reusable or biodegradable materials at church events and gatherings whenever possible.

Outreach efforts have included Plastic-Free July, hosting a harvest table for produce sharing, opening our doors during the Coast Guard parade as a cooling station, sponsoring an annual Eco-Summer program to encourage people to ride their bikes, walk, or carpool, helping encourage recycling at our summer picnics, helping with removal of invasive species at local parks, as well as helping to clean up local rivers and lakes.

In 2025, we plan to continue these efforts with Eco-Summer (beginning May 25), more *Tidings* articles, Earth Day events, Coast Guard cooling station, adding new members, Plastic-Free July, welcoming a guest speaker on creation care, and establishing relationships with other local environmental groups. We believe every church has a role in protecting God's Earth so it can flourish and be here to enjoy for generations to come.
