Advent and Christmas are here! I really love so much about this season, which makes up for the shorter days and the colder temperatures. I'm writing this with my eye towards Thanksgiving Day. This year I'm in charge of pies to bring to the family feast in Indiana. I'm going for pumpkin, pecan, apple, and the not-at-all-appropriate key lime for a wild card. The day after, my family will get our house all set for the season. On Saturday, we'll head downtown to support small businesses. Then Advent begins on Sunday, with a gathering to trim the church later that afternoon. While it seems very busy, I have a big smile on my face as I think about the joy of this season.

I hope you've got lots of your own traditions that bring you joy, and I trust that some of those connect you well with your church. We've been working hard getting ready for the Sundays of Advent, including making video connections with folks who can't make it to the sanctuary easily. There will be many events at the church — concerts, meals, and other celebrations. The Faith Formation Committee has a devotional for those looking to dig a little deeper, and the Children's Ministries Committee has Advent materials ready as well.

As the season draws to its close, I invite you to our special services. On the evening of December 21, we hold a Service of Light and Hope, which is a chance to enter the quietness and sadness that are part of this time of year. This is for anyone carrying a burden, and it's particularly helpful for those who are grieving. It's simply beautiful, and I hope you'll come.

Last year we devoted a service to our youngest and their families called Christmas Carols and Cookies. That service returns on December 23 at 4:30, right as Joyful Noise wraps up for the holidays. It's a 20-minute service of song, story, and lots of jingle bells.

Christmas Eve brings us two services. At 4:00, we'll have our Gathering Christmas Eve service, led by the Gathering Band. At 9:00, we'll hold our Traditional Christmas Eve service, led by the organ and Geneva Choir. This is a great opportunity to invite others to worship, so I hope you will! Finally, note that the Sunday after Christmas, we will hold a single service at 10:00, a chance to be together as a church family in the afterglow of all that is good about Christmas.

Finally, in this *Tidings*, you'll read a note from our beloved organist, Rob Hlebinsky. He has asked for and the session has granted him a leave of absence. I'll leave you to read his words, but I want to express my gratitude to the session for its holistic care for the staff. I also want to express my gratitude to Rob, both for recognizing that he needs this and for being a truly fantastic organist and musician. My prayers join yours for him in this leave.

Dear Church Family,

Our Faith Formation Team chose a great devotional for the Advent Season. Hopefully you've already picked yours up! If not, they'll be available in the office or in the Gathering area.

The title of this devotion is *What Do* You Fear? Insisting on Hope this *Advent.* Each week offers a variety of different styles—one day you might reflect on a hymn or song, another day on a poem about the coming of Christ. You'll also encounter meaningful artwork woven throughout. I appreciate how this devotional invites us in through different senses and perspectives.

The authors of this devotional also encourage us to use certain prompts for further reflection and prayer, such as: "Even in our fear, we are called forward," "Let fear fuel a fire for justice," and "Good news is


us to reflect on how we can share our fears with God to experience that Jesus is still with us. I find it significant that the authors point out that in Luke's Gospel, the story of Jesus' birth begins with "In the time of Herod." It's an easy phrase to gloss over, but when we do, we miss what was happening at that time. Herod was not a good dude and abused his power to oppress others, including the Jews. He was appointed king of Israel by Rome, but he was cruel. It was a fearful time to be born, as there was much instability and uncertainty about the future.

At the first Christmas, there were no decorations, cookies, or carols. It was a time of social and political upheaval. Anyone who wasn't a person of power—like Herod—lived with their well-being constantly under threat. It was into this uncertain and fraught moment that our Savior was born. Born to give us louder than fear." These prompts ask hope for now and the future. Born to

show us that God's love drives out our fear. Born to embody God's gracious and merciful love to all, especially the oppressed and suffering. Born to be the one true king who did not rule out of cruelty, but of love. I pray this Advent and Christmas season that we better understand how Jesus's birth brings us hope and stability in our fractured world.

A Note From Rob Hlebinsky

It feels cliché to say "To every thing there is a season, and a time to every purpose under heaven," but it does seem fitting in this case. Many of you have already heard this news, but for those who haven't, I have requested and been granted a leave of absence in the new year. I just wanted to take a few minutes to share with you some of the reasons for this decision.

My daughter will graduate from high school next spring and my role in her life will be changing as she starts college and moves toward independence. So, I need to start figuring out what's next for me. I appreciate all the opportunities that First Pres has afforded me, especially the freedom to explore new avenues as a musician. Over the last decade I have also discovered a passion for teaching, branched out into piano tuning, and realized just how much I enjoy working as a music arranger.

Right now, I'm not sure what I want from the next phase of my career. Back in college, I would have said I wanted to be a full-time director of music and/or organist for a church as well as having a performing career. With all the facets I've been able to explore both in and out of this church, I'm only certain that a "full-time" position isn't what I want. My hope is to take the first few months of 2026 to figure a lot of that out, as well as what my role with First Pres will continue to be into the future.

What will this look like? I will be away from my regular duties on an unpaid leave from January 12 through May 31. This doesn't mean I won't be around, though. I will still be practicing the organ and teaching lessons at the church, and I'll attend events when I can. With my time off, I hope to continue expanding my piano tuning business, figure out what avenues are open to me as a performer, and hopefully travel to meet with other organists with similar goals for the future of organ music.

I am so grateful to this church for the continued support and for allowing me the space to figure things out. I ask for prayers for guidance during my time away. I also want to reassure you that this is not "goodbye," it's just "see you soon."




Your Support Shapes Our Future: 2026 Pledge Status

"Second Mile Journey"

On a recent trip to Meijer it occurred to me that there is a correlation between Matthew 5:41 "If anyone forces you to go one mile, go with them two miles" and our response to the environmental crisis we are in currently. This thought was triggered as I was leaving the store. A couple was coming in and I overheard the man say "oh, I forgot the bags," and his wife agreed saying "you always do." That was the last of my eavesdropping, but it sparked a reflection: we are called to be stewards or "housekeepers" of God's creation.

So if you leave your reusable bags in your vehicle, take the extra steps to go back and get them. By doing so, you avoid using plastic bags and practice being a good "housekeeper," literally "going the second mile." If we all lived our lives practicing this "call" that Jesus spoke of, it would make a global difference.

The Earth Care Team has, over the years, shared multiple ways to practice this stewardship, with numerous articles available to guide you. The holiday season offers another opportunity to go the second mile. Use the links below to aid you on your "Second Mile Journey."
